> Founded on the latest Observeations, according to the Newtonian Theory;

And agreeing with the Heavens to a furprifing Exafnefs.

THE Two great Lamps of Heaven, viz. the Sun and Moon wi!!, this Year, afford four Ecliples, each Guminary two; thefe will happen in the following Order: The firt is a fmall Eclipfe of the Moon, upon Thuryday the 21 ft Jay of May, but invifible to us; for, with refpect to Lordon, our Metropolis, the Eclipfe begins at 9 min. paft 4 in the Afrernoon; the Middle (or Time of the greateft Obforation) happens 52 min . paft 4 ; and the Eclipfe will be quite over at 35 min . paft 5 o'Clock, Solar Time. At the Time of the greareft Cbfcuration (which is but 1 digit and 45 min .) the Moon will be vertical, or directly over their Heads at Mitnight, to fuch Perfons as happen at that Time to be failing a limle to the Weftward of the Coaft of Nemv Holland, called De Witt's Land, (which he difcovered in the Year 1616,) in Latitude 20 deg. 58 min . South, and 106 deg. 52 min . Eaft Longitude from London; confequently this Ectiffe will. be vifible to moft of the frnall llands difperfod in the great Pacific Ocean; Nerw Zealand, Nerw Hulland, the whole Extent of its Eaftern Corft, even to Van Dieman's Lard, its moit fouthern Premontory; the Itles of Sunda, Borneo, M d.ignfcar, the Pbilisines. Fapme, Yedao, and nearly the whole Continent of $A f i g$, together with the Eaftern Parts of Africa, even to the Cape of Good Hlope.

The Second is a central and annular Ecliple of the Sun, upon Scturday the 6 th of 7 fure, at 24 min. paft 5 in the Morning ; and notwithftanding the Sun at that Time is pretty high above our Horizon, yet by reafon of the Mron's South Latitude, which is alfo increafed by her Parallax, it will be invifible to us. This Eeclipfe will be central in the Meridian, or precifely at Nnon-Day, in 4 deg. 30 min . Sourh Latitude, and 100 deg. Eaft Longitude from London; which Place falls on the Weftern Coaft of Sumatra, one of the moft Weftern of the Sunda Mlands, where the Sun (to thofe who expect it) will make a moft beautiful Appearance in the Heavens, forming a very fmall Ping of Light round the Mcon's dark Body on every Side; yet it muft be a very great Surprife to thole Perfons, where ic comes unawares and unexpectedly, even fo, as to give a Shock to human Nature. It will be a very great Eclipfe in the Inands of Borneo and $7 a v a$, as well as in the Ifland of Smmatra, and, in thort, it will be a very great Eclif fe throughout the whole Indian Sea.

The Third Eclipfe this Year is of the leffer Light, namely, the Moon, upon Sunday the 15 th Day of November, in the Morning; the Beginning of which will only be vinible in the United Kingdom of Grent Britnin and Ire. land, France, Spain, Portugal, and the Weftern Parts of Africa. At the beginning of this Eclipfe the Moon will be vertical in the Weftern Ocean, in Latitude 18 deg. $5^{8}$ min. North, and 111 deg. 15 min . Weft Longitude from London, which Place falls on the Globe near a mall Mland, called Pafjon Ifand, on the Weftern Coaft of New Mexic', or New Spain, in Nosth America; from whence it appeas that the whole of this Eclipfe will be vifible at the Sand. quich Inands, at Otabsitt, and the reft of the Socitty Inands, and alfo at the Friendly Iflands in the great Sosith Sea. At the Middle of this Eclipfe the Moon will he vertical in Latitude 19 deg. 3 min . North, and 125 deg. 57 min. Weit Longitude frnm London; from which 1 find that the Moon will fet eclipfed about this Time in the Brazils, on the Eaftern Coaft of South America, and alfo at Cape. Horn. The Moon will rife eclipfed at the fame Time in Neru Zealand; an'I foon after the Middle, on the Eaftern Coaft of New Hollowl; and before the Eclipfe ends, at Port Facijon and Botamy Bay; for, at the lind
thereof, the Moon is vertical in Lat. 19 deg. 9 min. North, and 140 deg. 40 min . Weft Long. from London. From this Statement, it appears that the Whole of this Eclipfe will be vifible throughout North America, the Inland of Cuba, Famaica, Hifpaniola, and all the reft of the Weft India Inands; and the Ead thereof will extend itfelf as far as the Inands of $7 a p a n$ on the Eaftern Coaft, of $A i_{i a}$. The true ecliptic Oppofition of the Sum and Moon by my Tables is November $14^{\text {th }} 20 \mathrm{~h} .14 \mathrm{~m}$. I fec. P. M. Solar Time. The Moon's true Latitude is $47^{\prime} .6^{\prime \prime}$. N. D. and hourly Motion of Moon from Sun in her relative Orbit $28^{\prime} .18^{\prime \prime}$. the Moon's horizontal Parallax $55^{\circ} \cdot 4^{\prime \prime}$. and that of the Sun's $9^{\prime \prime}$. ; Sun's Semidiameter $16^{\prime} 12^{\prime \prime}$. and that of the Moon is $15^{\prime} \cdot 4^{\prime \prime}$.; Angle of the Mon's vifible Way $5^{\circ} \cdot 40^{\prime} \cdot 40^{\prime \prime}$; correct Semidiameter of the Earth's Shadow $39^{\prime} .56^{\prime \prime}$. ; and the neareft Approach of the Centres of Moon and Eartb's Shadow, is $46^{\prime} 52^{\prime \prime}$. The following Delineation thows the Beginning of this Eclipfe, and Manner of the Moon's fetting at Lonatn, and Parts adjacent, and will nearly ferve the Whole of our Ifland.

The laft Eclipfe which happens this Year, is an Eclipfe of the Sun, upon Advent Sunday, the 29th Day of November, and vifible here, fhould the Air prove favourable. In the Southern Parts of the Earth, this will be a very large Eclipfe, central; but whether it will prove total, I will not be pofitive; for, by my Calculations, the Sun and Moon's Diameters are about equal, fo that a very fmall Error either Way will make it either total or annular, though without Continuance. The following Type is a Reprefentation of this Eclipfe, as it is expected to appear at London, and Parts adjacent, and may, in a great Meafure, ferve the Kingdom at large.-v. The Sun's Vertex, or upper Limb.


In thefe, our Northern Parss of the Globe, this will prove but a very finall Eclipfe, by Reafon of the Moon's parallax in Lati ude depreffing herfo very far to the South. ward; for though the Moon's true Latitade, at the Time of the vifible Conjumetion, is $30^{\circ} .33^{\circ}$. North, ye: by her Parallax, her vifible Latitude will be about $2 f^{\prime} .28^{\prime \prime \prime}$. South, which caufes the Eclipfe to befmall with us.

At Lordon (and nearly foat Cambritge and Royfon) the Moon will be ohferved to make the firft Impreftion on the Sun's Limb, at $119^{\circ}$. from his Vertex, on the right Fland, at the Type fheweth; and the Eclipfe begins a 42 min. paff $100^{\prime}$ Clock in the Morning; the Middle of the Eclipfe, will be at 37 min . paft 11 , when the surs will appear nearly one Quarter eclipfed; the Moon quits the Sum, and the Eclipfe will end at 31 min . paft 12 , accorting to foiar. or apparent Time.

The Duratior of this Eclinfe will be I hour 49 min .Digits eclipled at Lindon, $2^{\circ} \cdot 59^{\circ} .25^{\prime \prime}$.

Note. - It will be Six Years before there will be another Eclipfe of the Sur, and Two Years before there will be one of the Mom, vilible in Enclind.

At the Time of the late total Eclipfe of the Moom, $\mathcal{F}_{u l y}$ y inth, 1805, the Weather was rather unfavourable, but the Clouds began to feparate about $\rho$, at Night, fo that $\mathbf{I}$ faw the Moon, juft as the was emerging out of total Dark-nefs, but could not obferve the exact lime ; it afterwards becarne more clear, and I exaitly obferved the End of the Eclipfe to be at Royston (which is only $\delta^{\prime \prime}$ in Time Eaft of Londoin) at 54 min . patt $100^{\prime}$ Clock, app. T. or 59 min . paft 10 o' Clock. I found my 'Type of it to be exactly right, and iny Time of ic proved fo alio. A Dukinefs was obferved on the Moon's Limb for a Minute or tivo aiter the Eclipfe was ended, or the Moun's quitting the Earth's dark. Shadow.

## Siderum Congrefus.

This Year afierds bust little on this Head of Information, yet for the Sake of fuch as have good Telefcopes, and are delighted with this Kind of Speculation, 1 here. mention a few that may be worth Notice, and vifibue here.

2. On Saturday the 2 if of February in the Morning, the Moon will eclipfe a fmall Star in Cancer, which is of the 4 th Magnitude ; at London, the Inmerfion will take Place at 16 min. part $20^{\circ} \mathrm{Clock}$; and the Emerfion will be at 8 min . after 3 , app. Time.
3. On Thurfary, April the 16 th, in the Evening, the Moon eclipfes the fame Star again, when the Immerfion will be at Lordon, at 49 min . rat $70^{\prime}$ Clock; and the Emerfion will be at $90^{\prime}$ Clock exactly, according to app. Time.
4. On Thurday, the 18th of fune, in the Morning, the Mlon eclipfes the Star Delta in Scorpio, which is of the 3 d Maguitude. At Londor, the Immerfion will be at 15 min . pait I ; and the Emerfion at 8 min . after $20^{\prime}$ Clock, folar Time.
5. On Wcdncflar, the rith of Auguff, the new Georgiays Planet will be in Cqnjunction of the Planet Mars, as feen from the Earth, when Mars will appear about 56 min . more to the South. 'They may be feen before they fet that Evening.
6. On Sunday Morning, Ozaber the 25 th, the Morn eclipfes another Star in Cancer, of the 4th Magnitude; the Immerfion at London will be at 33 min . paft 2 that Morning, and the Emerfion will be at 23 min . paft $30^{\prime}$ Clock, folar Time.

Note.-The beautiful Planet Venus will gild our Evenings with her refulgent Beams, by making a pretty Appearance in the Weft after the Sun is fet, efpecially from the End of May to the End of Auguft, as the will thine late at Night, and particularly fo in the Months of 7 une and $7 u l y$.

## METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS, \&e. With Remarks on the Weather in $1810{ }^{\circ}$.

UNDER the Depth of S.AIN fallen at London, in the Year 805 , given at the Top of the right Hand Page of every Month, I have pointed out the Time when there is a great Probability of Rain or Snow (more or lefa) within the.fhort Compafs of tbree Days, according to my Rules and Obferrations; and though this Change in the State

State of the Air may fometimes take Place a Day or two fooner or later, and perhafs even fometimes mifs (from fome unknown Caufes operating at the Time,) yet neverthelefs, within this fmall Limit, my Predictions on this Head have mofly been wonderfully verified, notwithftanding the great Difficulty of the Subject, efpecially in this Inand of ours; therefore worthy, I think, of fome Notice. Now thefe particular Times of an Alteration in the Atmofphere for either Rain or Surv, with the Weather mentioned in the Columns of each Month, make up my general Judgment of the Weather for that Month; but after all, let me advife the induftrious Crazior and Farmer, to Atudy the Ufe of a good Barometer, that is well adjufted, and net fixed too high for his Obfervation; and let him be particular about it at all Times of the Year, as well as juft in Hay-time and Harveft, fo that he may clearly underfand its Indications, left perhaps, when he mofl wants its Aid, he may give a wrong Judgment, is fometimes has been the Cafe with thofe not very well verfed in thefe Inftuments; but with thofe portable Weather Glaffes I make and fell I give particular Rules and Directions, whereby the moft ignorant may foon under: fand them, which, in fome Seafons, may be Pounds in a Farmer's Way, as I have noticed for more than forcy Years. I cannot too much warn my Countrymen againit bad Inftruments of this Kind; they cannet be too cautious about them, therefore purchafe from the very beft Hands. But to return:-The Year 1805 was pretty uniform as to its Temperature, with refpect to Heat and Moifure, yet, of its 22 Inches of Rain that fell, above 9 Inches and a half of it fell in the three Summer Months of 7 une, $\mathcal{F} u l y$, and Auguf; it was a very growing. Time, but the Harveft was rather late, yet very productive in moft Parts of the Kingdom; but though late, it was well got in; the Quickfilver in the Bairometer flanding very high for the moft part, efpecially in the Months of $\mathcal{F} u l y$, Alrguf, September, and Part of Oczober, which indicated fine Weather, and I think I never knew the Barometer higher than it was once this Year ; namely, about the Middle of November. In looking over my Journal kept at Royfor, in Howfomblaive, I find the hotteft Day to be the 12 th of $A u g u f$, and the coldeft the 13 th of December, in this Year of 1805.

Adverfity is the beft Inftructor of both Nations and Individuals, in true Wifdom; for whilt Vice, Irreligion, and Impiety, are fo prevalent throughout the Nation, and but few, comparatively confidered, are living accord. ing to the Precepts of God, it cannot be expected that he will pafs over our Tranfgreflions, and not vifit this Country with a Scourge, when He arifeth to chaftife the Nations of the Earth; but on the other Hand, ye pour, aflicted, and diftreffed, who go Mourning all your Days for the Wickednefs and Abominations of the Land, and tremble at the Judgments of God, which are abroad in the Earth;-the Scriptures abound with much Confolation to raife your drooping Spirits; and though the horrid Din of Arms, and the Thunders and Ravages of War may difturb your Peace and Comfort in this World, yet ye fhall find fweet Repofe, even amidft contending Elements, the Wreck of Nations, and the Crafh of Worlds; for God is in the Tempeft directing thie Storm : and though the Conteft is tremendous and deftructive, yet ere long, I truft, that God, by the British Nation, will yet give
univerfal Pcace to the World, efpecially to aftlitcd Europe; therefore lift up yourHeads with Joy, for your Redemption feems to be drawing nigh.-See my Almanack for 1798, p. 43.

I fhall now, as ufual, prefent my Readers with a remarkable Hieroglyphic, alluding to thefe wonderful Times.-I thall omit the deciphering of the Characters, as they relate to a $V$ iew of Mundane Affairs, but leave them to Time and the Curious to coniftrue.


Obfervations on the Four Quarters of the Year, deduced from the Influx and Influences of the Planets, operating therein. Of the Winter Quarter.
The Winter Quarter begins when the Sum, in his Annual Circuit, firft touches the Southern Tropic, called Capricorn, which this Year that Iuminary will do, on Monday, the 22 d of Dcember; 1806 , at 5 min . paft 11 in the Forenoon, when 17 deg. of $f$ will be upon the Nedium Cali, and 28 deg . of $m$ on the Horofcope, or Afcendant. All the Planets at this Ingrefs I find are above the Earth, exvept

the Moon, who is in the 2d Houfe, defluxing from a Zodiacal 8 of $h$, and $\Delta$ of 4 , and $\Delta$ of Mars. - In turning my Eyes over this Chart of the Heavens, and ruminating over the Pofitions, Comections, and Communications of the planetary Orbs, I have no doubs but that there will be in this Quarter, many eminent Councils and Confultations held, in moft of the Courts of Europe, on the Subject of Negociation and Peace, and Change of Hands, and of Alterations in Kingdoms and States, and that fome great Defigns and Actions are now on Foot, or at leaff foon will be, in England, Prulia, Holland, France, Germany and Spaity. The Northern Powers, fuch as Srweden, Rulfia and Denmark, will alfo be included in thefe Confultations and Defigns; -and I fay, that they are likely to be carried on and profecuted with great Refolution and - Vigour,-but Time mult produce the Particulars, for at prefent, many Things feem to be enveloped in Darknefs', that no Human Sagacity can at prefent penetrate into the Defigns of the different Powers on the Continent. But it feems to me, that the French Government is wonderfully bufy, and I fear with too much Succefs by Land, but not by Sea; even with all the Dutch Shipping to boot,-fo that, ere long, the Vaunts and Menaces of our moft vengeful Foe, will pars off, like a Guft of Wind, that roared and died away. - The Emperor of Germany has of late, and is fill like to fuffer Vexations and Troubles; yet rhat noble Houfe will remair, it will not be deftroyed. Spain feems alfo to be trembling with the moft fearful Fore- bodings, efpecially about her Poffeffions in the Weftern World.-The Uhited States of America; yes, I fay, the United States of America, will be much agitated by Broils and Difcontent:- I fay, they muft take Care of French Counfels. I ufed to warn Holl ind, but Holland, it feems, could not help herfelf; the Uni ied States of America can, if they take fome Precaution and Warning in due Time. But to come nearer Home, into our own Cuuntry, there feems to be a confiderable Difcontent among he People, or at leaft foon will be, concerning Taxes, and other heavy Burthens and Impofts.

## Of the Vernal, or Spring Quarter.

Tyis $Q$ iarter commences the 2 ift Day of March, at 36 min . paft 12 at Noon, when 10 deg. of $\Upsilon$ will be on
the Mid-heaven, and 3 deg. of the Regal Sign Leo, will be upon the Afcendant. - The Moon, 1 find, will be in 26 deg. of $\Omega$ departing from a Trine Afpect of , ళ, and alfo the fame of remus, and alfo applying to a Conjunction as feen from the Earth, of Mars in Virgo; and what is rather remarkable, the two inferior Planets, Venus and Mercury, are in Conjunction, in the South Angle of the Heavens, juft as they were at the Commencement of the Winter Quarter; now in the Equinoctial Sign $r$, but before in the Sign $f .-$ The reft of the Planets are polited as the following Scheme fheweth.


This Scheme of the Heavens, like that of the Winter Quarter, forebodes to us, and all Europe, fome unpleafant Things, for though there appear Negociations going forward, tending to reftore to the groaning World the Bleffings of Peace and Tranquillity; yet, I am afraid, according to the Figure, that the Luft of Ambition, and the Rage for Revenge, will continue to diftract and difturb many Parts of Europe, as well as our own Nation, by the refllefs Ambition of the Emperor of France. This, I mult tell you, will be a very bufy Ycar, and fome
are like to fall under great Troubles, Loffes and Croffes, by high Demands, and hafty and rah Proceedings, and this is alfo likely to be the Cafe with the Weftern World, as well as many Parts of Europe. - Men's Minds are fill in great Ferment, their Paffions run high, and will, I fear, not be eafily reduced to Reafon; though indeed, the late Scxtile of upiter and Saturn, intimated at leaft, that in order to check the prevalent perverfe Difpofition of Mankind, fome worthy Man, or Men, would interpofe, and do their utmoft Endeavours to calm thefe unruly Pafions; and allay, if poffible, the Heats and Animofities of the Times, in order to reconcile contending Parties in War and Bloodhed; but, alas, I fear they will not be able, at prefent, wholly to do this, as appears by the $S_{\text {quaring of }}$ two fuperior Planets 7 upiter, and Saturn, during fo much of this Year; and likewife the Planet Mars' long Pofition in Virgo, a Human Sign. - Indeed, if a Negociation for Peace has not by this 'Time fucceeded, and that under the Intuence of the Sextile Afpect of Fupiter and Saturn, I am doubtful of its being concluded before the Autumn of this Year, if then; for the Square Afpeit of thofe Planets in this Quarter, and alfo repeated again in $A u g u f$, undoubtedly fignifies great Changes and Alterations to happen in the World, with Broils, unfortunate Jars and Difcontents, with Difcords and treacherous Confpiracies.-The Raven made feveral Progreffions, and the Dove herfelf more than one, before fhe brought in the Olive Branch.
