Thus, when the Moon is 1 or 16 Days old, it is High Water at Beachy, Candado, Dover, &c. at 38 Minutes past 11 o'Clock. And so of the rest. As to the Moon's Age, you find it in the 6th Column on every left hand Page of the Calendar.

How to fet a Clock of Watch by this Table. For Example, Jan. the 1st, I find, by looking into the Table, that a Clock to be right must be 3 Minutes 48 Seconds faster than a Sun Dial; therefore I set it so much faster accordingly. And so of the rest. Twelve o'Clock is the best Time to set a Clock or a Watch by a Dial.

Note, A Sun Dial shews Solar or Apparent Time, but a Clock, &c hould be set to Equal or Mean Time, as the Table directs; to go true.

#### AN ACCOUNT OF THE

### ECLIPSES of the SUN and MOON.

And other Appearances in the Heavens, In the Year 1810.

CALCULATED FROM NEW AND IMPROVED SOLAR AND LUNAR TABLES,

Founded on the Newtonian System of Gravitation,

And agreeing with Observations to a surprising Exactness.

ITHIN the Limits of this Year, there will be only two Eclipses, and they both of the Sun; none of the Moon can happen this Year, for the following Reason, in the Words of the great Kepler, Novilunia duo centralibus propinqua; Ergo, Circumstantia Plenilenia illibata Eclipsis Lunæ toto Anno rullo; for which Reason also, such Solar Eclipses are seldom visible with us here in England, although the Sun should be above the Horizon,

and shone ever so bright.

The first of these Eclipses will be on Wednesday, the 4th day of April, at 37 min. past One o'Clock in the Morn. ing; consequently, must be invisible to us on that Account only; but in the great South Pacific Ocean, where it is visible, it will be a very great Eclipse, central and annular, the Sun's Diameter being 32'o", and the Moon's not more than 31' 28" of a degree. In 154 deg. 41 min. of East Longitude from London, and under 11 deg. 20 min. of North Latitude, the SUN will be centrally Eclipsed precisely at Noon Day, when a small bright Circle of Light will appear round the Moon's dark Body, every Side, which is at 41 min. past our 1 o'Clock in the Morning; therefore, I find that this Eclipse will be visible (more or less in Quantity and Duration) at the Sandwich Islands, the Friendly Islands, the New Hebrides, New Caledonia; the Northern Coast of New Holland, New Ireland, New Guinea, the Ladrone Islands, and as far North

as the Island of Japan; and Westward to the Philippine Islands, and I expect as far as the Island of Borneo, and


the other small Islands thereabout.

The Second of these Eclipses will be on Friday, the 28th Day of September, at 46 min. past 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon; but notwithstanding the Sun is not then Set, it will be invisible to us, by reason of the Moon's true Latitude being South, and that also increased by her Parallax in Latitude, will depress the visible Place of her Centre more than is the Space taken up by the Semi-diameters of the Sun and Moon. This, like the former, will be a very great Eclipse in the Southern Parts of the Globe; for in that large Kingdom PERU, in South America, the Sun will be centrally Eclipsed and Annular; and the Ring of Light round the Moon, will be broader than in the last Eclipse; as the apparent Diameter of the Sun is 1 min. 30 fec. more than that of the Moon. This Appearance will be precisely at their 12 o'Clock at Noon, under 6 deg. 7 min. South Latitude, and 72 deg. 19 min. of West Longitude from London; and this is at 49 min. past our 4 o'Clock in the Afternoon; confequently, this Eclipse will be visible in a partial Manner (more or less) to the greatest Part of South America; it will also extend itself to the Island of Jamaica, to the Island of Hispaniola, called by fome St. Domingo, and all the Rest of the West India Islands.

# Other Appearances in the Heavens.

An Eclipfe is a fleeting Disappearance of a luminous Body, caused by the Interposition of some opake or dark Body; and as the Planets are suspended one above another in unequal and concentric Orbits, which cut each other in opposite Points, they also may at certain Times, two or more of them, meet in the same visual Ray, whereby the inferior Star or Planet will, by Density, deprive us for a while of the Sight of the Superior. Hence it is evident, that besides the Eclipses of the Luminaries properly so called, the other Planets, and also the fixed Stars, are subject to Eclipses. The most remarkable that will be visible to us, of this Sort, in the present Year, as eclipsed

eclipsed by the Moon, are the following. The sirst then of these Eclipses, or rather Occultations, which I shall notice, is of the Planet Jupiter, on Thursday, Feb. 8th, in the Evening. The Moon will be seen approaching this since Star for some Time, before the Immersion takes Place, when the Eastern dark Edge of the Moon will take Jupiter at 4 min. past 8 o'Clock, as at I, in the annexed Type; and Jupiter will again emerge from behind the




bright Edge of the Moon, as at E, at 40 min. past 8, as in the Type; after being hid 36 minutes. This will make a beautiful Appearance through a good. Achromatic Telescope, (should the Air be clear) as all Jupiter's Satellites will be visible, two of them to the Left, and the

other two to the Right Hand of Jupiter; but they will

appear in an oblique Direction from the Spectator.

Note.—The Planet Jupiter is a large stupendous Globe, of Ninety-four Thousand Miles in Diameter, and is undoubtedly an Habitable World, or else, to what Purpose are his several Scasons, his four Moons, but for the Use of his Inhabitants, his Nights and Days, his Winters and Summers, his New and Full Moons? All which by our Telescopes, we see and know he hath; but our little Earth is not quite Eight Thousand Miles in Diameter; a Globe certainly very small, when compared to that of Jupiter.

The next Occultation worthy of Notice, is a visible



Transit of the Moon over a fixed Star of the first Magnitude, called Aldebaran, and happens on Tuesday, the 18th of September, at Night. The bright Edge of the Moon first takes the Star, and the Immersion takes Place at 4 min. past 100'Clock,

as at I, in the annexed Type thereof. This Star will be obscured from Sight for 55 minutes, and then comes out from behind the dark Edge of the Moon, at 59 min. past 10, as at E, in the Type.

On Friday, December the 21st, in the Morning, foon after the Maon rifes, she eclipses the Planet Mars; they



will rife together, about 2 min. past 2 o'Clock, and Mars will immerge behind the bright Edge of the Moon, near her upper Horn, at 6 min. past 2; as the annexed Type sheweth at I; and Mars will appear again from behind the Moon's dark Edge, as at E, 36 min. past 2 o'Clock; after being hid 30 min.

Note.—The Times of these Occultations are calculated and adapted to the Latitude and Meridian of London, as are also the Delineations of them; and at finall Distances from London, as at Cambridge and Oxford, there will not be much Difference.

I wish it fair, that Artists may descry. These various Stars eclipsed, to verify. Their Calculations; if it chance to rain, Or if 'tis Cloudy, then we watch in vain.

# METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS, &c.

Relating to the Year 1808; with Remarks on the Barometer, or Weather Glass.

THE diffinguishing Feature of the Year 1808, is for a remarkably hot and dry July; a Month in which we generally expect warm Weather; but in this Year, the Heat was rather uncommon for this Climate, even fo, that on Wednesday, the 13th, (which may very well be called the Hot Wednesday) it was so excessively hot, that divers Persons died, or were in great Danger of Death; and several Horses on the Road dropped down and died the same Day; and for several Days then about, it was as

hot

hot as in the Island of Famcica in the West Indies, which is not common in this Country, especially for so many Days together. In this Year alfo, we had a very backward Spring; the Month of January was very cold and frosty, throughout; and February much the same, with a very deep Snow on the 12th, which lay for fome Time; the Barometer was remarkably high on the 25th Day. March in general was very cold, yet dry, and proved a good Seed time; the Wind was mostly East and North East, the Barometer standing very high. In April, the Barometer kept pretty high and fleady, but with a warmer Atmosphere, yet there was a sharp Frost on the 1st, 2d, and 20th Days. The Month of May was very fine, the Barometer generally pretty high. Thunder on the 7th, 18th, and 22d Days. The Month of June also proved fine; much Rain on the 9th and 23d. On the 15th of July, a great Tempest, with Thunder and Lightening, in Gloucestersbire, Dorsetsbire, Somersetsbire, and Wiltsbire; the Thermometer with me, in the Shade within Doors, was on the 12th at Noon, at 81 deg. the 13th at 88 deg. and on the 14th at 87 degrees, according to Fahrenheit's Scale: fo great a Heat has not, I believe, been felt in this Country fince the Year 1779. The Month of August was in general fine for the Harvest, yet the great Heat of July, with the Rain that followed on the 28th, &c. of that Month, brought on a Mildew, fo that the Wheat Crops, proved not fo good in Quality as the Harvest before. The Barometer stood pretty high most of the Month. In September and October much Rain fell, fo that thefe two Months had as much Rain as the five preceding Months taken together. November was more dry, and in December there was not much Rain; but on the 21st much Snow fell, which made the Roads impassable for fome Days. The coldest Day in 1808 was the 22d of 7anuary, and the hottest was July the 13th, as I have before noticed. My BAROMETERS are made portable, and can be fent very fafely to any Part of the Kingdom.

May we not, therefore, be justified in considering the present Power of France, as the appointed Instrument of Punishment to the corrupt Part of the Christian World, and of Discipline and Trial to all the rest?

HAD the Courtefy of the present Times deserved it at my Hands, I would have given an Explanation of all the Hieroglyphics of all my former Almanacks, which perfectly represented the present Condition of the English and other Nations. You who read these Lines must know I do no new Thing; I do herein but imitate the Ancients, who, so often as they resolved to conceal their Intentions from prophane Hands, used Hieroglyphics, Images, &c. 
O'sfervations on the Four Quarters of the Year, deduced from the Influx and Influences of the Planets, and the late Comet, operating therein.

# Of the Brumal Ingress, or Winter Quarter.

THE Winter Quarter begins when the Sun touches the first Scruple of the Tropical Sign Capricorn, and that will be on Friday, the 22d of December, 1809, at 38 min. past 4 o'Clock in the Morning; at which Time 7 Degrees in the East. The D ab 8 O et ad of 21, from the 2d, 5th, and 9th Houses of the Figure of the Heavens fet to that Time. The Planets are all under the Horizon, except the Moon, which was shining in the South-West Quarter, having just past an Opposition of the Sun, and fast approaching to a Zodiacal Square Aspect of the Planet Jupiter, from Tropical and Equinoctial Signs; but this is not all, the Planet Mars is located in the 3d, departing from a Sextile Afpect of the Planet Saturn, and before the End of January, will be in a Square Aspect of that Planet; and this will be repeated again about the 11th of March following. These Configurations will principally influence this Quarter; yet they may extend for fome months after; and this I would have my Readers always to bear in Mind; and that is, when I treat of the different Quarters of the Year, as well as the different Months, I by no Means mean to confine what I fay folely to that Quarter or that Month, for Planetary Influences may act, and often do act, at a Distance from that Time, and the Events fignified thereby may fall out fooner or later. But to return, I therefore fay, these Pofitions of the Planets (with other Things taken into Confideration) shew much Strife and Debates, with serverse

and mischievous Proceedings, amongst Kings, Princes, Dukes, Lords, and Senators, about Rights, Privileges, War, Peace, &c. as has been customary for several Years bick; and therefore, after a Year of much Fighting and Bloodshed, between the contending Powers of the Earth, the Political Affairs of the World stand as much as ever unfettled, and in as much uncertain Posture. That Revolutionizing Spirit, that has been working in most Countries, is still active. Germany, Spain, and Portugal. and other Parts of Europe, which I could name, feel Tumults and Warlike Noises, with a great falling away of the People, with Treachery and Deceit. A certain EMPEROR will throw down and root out the Roman Antichrist with all her Members-for War, horrid War! is still the Language of the Celeftial Premonitors. I fee in the East, the Turkis Empire evidently decaying; the Luxury of their Sultans occasions their being often deposed; their Divisions by many Sects, and the factious Dispositions of their Janisaries, do evidently weaken their once mighty Power, as well as their frequent Defeats which they have received in our Age; which will not cease until the whole Turkifs Empire is divided and nearly destroyed. The Sceptre and Diadem will, I fear, be laid down, or taken away from the House of Austria; that illustrious House feems to be decaying; yet after some sharp Fighting, a Negotiation takes place. Boheria will also feel great Tamults. In the North, the Squedes have had an amazing Revolution, and are still projecting another; the Russians are in Distress, and almost ruined by French Councils; there has been, or will be, great Actions to do there. The poor Danes also are in a reftless Situation; and indeed, the whole of Europe will experience Broils and Devastations; and, I am forry to fay, England is not free from Troubles and the Fate of war.

# Of the Vernal, or Spring Quarter.

The Sun was, with Propriety, called by the Ancients the Heart of Heaven; for as the Action of the corporeal Heart gives Life and Motion to all the innumerable Ramifications of the Human Frame, fo does the Sun's vivifying Power operate through all the Mundane System. When the Heart ceases to palpitate, Animal Life is at an End; and, if the Sun should cease to disfuse his Light and Heat, Darkness and Consusion would be the Consequence. To this glorious Luminary, the exhaustless Fountain of universal Light and Life, we chiefly owe the Variation of the Seasons. He now begins to display his genial Influence; for, the 21st of March, at 12 min. past 6 in the Morning, he enters the Equinoxial Sign Aries; at that Time 3 Degrees of 19 will culminate, and 8 Degrees of Aries will ascend the Eastern Horizon;

when the Face of the Heavens are as represented in the above Scheme.

The Dab 8 o et 9; ad \* b et 8 8; and Cardinal Signs possess the Four Angles of the Figure, with a Conjunction of Jupiter and Mars in the Ascendant, in Aries, the reputed Ascendant of the English Nation. This is a very untoward Position, when we consider the Opposition of Saturn and Mars, so soon to sollow; Mars being also in a human Sign; the Moon also being in an Opposition of the Sun from Equinoctial Signs. Hence, we must not flatter ourselves, that this will be a Time of Ceffation from Troubles; fome farther Undertakings will be first attempted, and many Alterations in States and Kingdoms remain yet to be brought about, before that defirable Time comes. The God of War still brandishing his Sword in Earnest: Here Wranglings, Strife, and Contention; there Robberies, Murders, and outrageous Proceedings; in this Place, Rebellions, Manacres, and Devastations: nor can we, who have always been accounted subject to Aries, expect to come off Scot. free: and should we take in those Countries subject to Quadratic Signs, according to the usual Method, we shall, by fo doing, extend our Threats into various Countries out of Europe, and perhaps in fo doing, not far exceed our Bounds: But amidst all these Threats, I am bold to fay, the Fleets of ENGLAND will not this Year be conquered at Sea; for they will ride Triumphant to all Parts of the Globe; but yet, for all this, let us not at all Times be too confident, for the Battle is not always to the Strong, nor the Race to the Swift-yet, I still fay, ENGLAND has nothing to fear from her implacable Enemies the French, if she is but just and true to herself, and that in every Sense of the Word. But on the other Hand, the French Emperor NAPOLEON BUONAPARTE, though he has been pressed hard on every Side, and involved by the warlike furrounding Powers into mary Difficulties, still feems determined to brave all his Opponents! 'The French will in the general succeed, either by Fight. ing or Negociating, or both, upon the Continent of Europe, until their great Head drops into the Grave, which according to his Nativity, I rather expect may be by a violent death; however, he will not live to be very aged.

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Several States and petty Princes in Germany are still involved in Distinction, Broils, and Uneasiness, so are they in Italy, in Spain, Portugal, and Holland; and a Jealousy subsists between Russia and the House of Austria; also the Turkish Empire is surrounded with Warlike and other Troubles. Our West India Islands are very well off, so is America; if their Country should be shook to its Centre, it will be by their own internal Broils and Discontents. Thus much for my Judgment upon the Vernal Quarter, which is meant to take in the whole Year as to generals. It is also more than probable, that there will be another Offer for Peace this Year with the British Government.

# Of the Estival or Summer Quarter.

This Quarter begins on Friday, the 22d of June, at 54 min, past 3 in the Morning; when the first Degree of Cancer ascends, and 26 Degrees of Aquarius are on the Medium Cœli; the Moon is in 7 Deg. of X, in the 10th House, applying to the Square of Saturn, and next to the of Mars; the Sun also has but lately past an & of b. and a Conjunction of Mars; all which Positions will very much help on the Effects of former Influences of the Spring Quarter, with respect to the Political Affairs of the World. I hope London, and other Places, will be preferved this Summer from the fatal Effects of the SMALL-Pox, which is like to be very Rife. I earnestly recommend to the People of England, the VACCINE INOCULATION, as the best and safest Mode of preventing that violent Scourge of the Human Race, the Small-Pox; for the Idea of doing which, we are much indebted to the Genius and Industry of Dr. JENNER. And, it must also be remembered, that though the Inoculation of the Cow-Pox is a novel Practice, yet the Disease, in its natural State, has been known for Time immemorial, and its Power of preventing the Small-Pax has long been acknowledged, especially in those Districts where it is most accustomed to prevail; and the Voice of the People in those Parts for nearly a Century, have borne Witness to its affording a full Security from the Small-Pox; and its Effects also have ever been considered as rather beneficial than injurious to the Human Constitution, which which is not always the Case with respect to the Small-Pox. But to return, The various States and Kingdoms of Europe continue to be much divided, and the French as well as the Engliss are also very active; for on these two great Governments hang all the Politicks of Europe. The Ottoman Empire continues to be much distracted, and some new Troubles and Brotlane about to rise in the North. Some Overtures for Peace may now be in Agitation, yet I suspect they will not be ponderous enough to turn the Scale, at least for the present; as every State and every Country is so much out of Order. The Weather this Summer is likely to be various, with hasty Showers, attended with Thunder and Lightening, in many Parts of this Kingdom.

## Of the Autumnal Quarter.

This Quarter begins on Sunday, the 23d of September, at 43 min. past 5 in the Asternoon; at which Time 20 Deg. of A ascend, and 26 Deg. of A culminate; the Moon is in 4 Deg. of A, departing from the \* of 4, and next applying to the \$\triangle\$ of \$\bar{1}\$, and \$\to\$ of \$\bar{2}\$. The Mutual Aspects near this lugress are a Square of Jupiter and Mars, the Square of Saturn and Mars, which follow soon after. Hence, we may expect to hear of Discontents, Depressions, and Impediments in Public Affairs, with great Complaints as usual; with Murmuring and Repining against Men in Authority, &c. Many Diseases seem to be impending this Quarter, particularly Fevers, with Pains and Instruction in the Throat and Breast, caused by unwholesome Blasts, turbulent and contagious Air.
