## Of the Eclipses for the Year, 1765.

HERE will be fix Eclipses to the Inhabitants of this Globe, four of the Sun, and two of the Moon, they will happen in the following order.

The first is an invisible Eclipse of the Sun, on February the

19th, at 11 at Night.

The fecond is of the Moon, on March the 7th, at 1 o'Clock in the Afternoon, and therefore invisible.

The third is of the Sun, on March the 21st, at 1 in the

Afternoon, but invisible also.

The fourth is a small Eclipse of the Sun, on the 16th of August, at 4 in the Asternoon; and because it is so small, for in the most northern parts of Europe, as at Moseow in Russia, St Petersburg, and at Stockbolm in Swedeland, where it is the most visible, there are scarcely 2 digits eclipsed; therefore I shall not trouble myself or my readers with any thing more about it.

The fifth is of the Moon, on the 30th of August, at 4 in

the Afternoon, and invisible also.

The fixth is of the Sun, on September 15th, at 5 in the Morning, and invisible also: thus much for this Year's Ecliptes.

But as I faid in my last Years Almanack, that the general effects of the folar Eclipse, which was on the 1st Day of April 1764, would be apparent in the Years 1765 and 1766. I shall according to my promise, give you a more particular Judgment of that Eclipse. Now according to the precepts of Astrology, great Damages do environ and befall such Persons, especially as are fignified by Sol; and we all know he reprefents no mean ones, but Men in Authority, as Kings, Princes, Governours of eminent Places, &c. As he was then darkned and eclipfed near to his Exaltation, near the Culmen Cæli, and greatest summity of his Altitude, so astrologically may we deduce this Conjecture; viz. that it prefageth to them an Adumbration and Eclipfing of their Honours and Dignities, even in that point of Time, when they are in their height of Honour, and it likewise seems to prenote that a Company

a Company of cunning and subsile pharifaical Hypocrites, shall arise in Sheep's Cloathing, who by their infinuating and crafty wiles, shall bewitch the ignorant, and deceive the very Elect too, were it possible; if Authority in Time do not supplant them. Such I say must come, and never more likely than now. Our bleffed Saviour himself, forewarns us of them, in Matth. xxiv. 23, 24. Mark xiii. 21. Tunc, si quis vobis dixerit, ecce, bic Christus, aut bic, ne credatis, excitabuntur enim pseudo Christi, et pseudo prophetæ, et edent signa magna & miracula, ita ut seducant (ut fieri possit) etiam elestos. Certainly we may gather from many Places of holy writ, that these are the very Times there spoken of, which will infallibly come to pass; yet I verily believe that after these things are fulfilled, there shall immediately succeed a Golden Age, wherein the diverse Forms of religious and politic Government shall be changed, and made conformably to the will of God; but lest I should digress, I must turn into the way again, and speak more particularly of this famous Eclipse. Sol cum laborare, says my Author, vivus fuerit in denaris secundo arietis, regum carcerem, et mærorem, aut mortis periculum, arborumque frucliferarum corruptionem, ac terne nascentium, putredinem: When the Sun shall suffer Eclipse in the second face of Aries, it portends imprisonment and grief to some King, or peril of his death, also Corruption of Fruit Trees and rottenness of Things, growing upon the Face of the Earth. Fiunt in mundo multa incommoda, quando erit in uno mense, utriusque Luminaris Eclipsis præcipue in his locis quibus est significatio ecrum specialis: Hermes in centiloqui 53 enunciato: In the World many evils will happen, when in one Month there shall be an Eclipse of both Luminaries, chiefly in those Places subject to the signs they are in; we had then both Luminaries eclipsed in one Month, and both visible too. and therefore it's much to be fear'd we shall, 'ere their Effects determine, see fresh troubles and divisions, and great differences in Opinions; Neighbour still murmuring against Neighbour, and Brother against Brother, et quid non; generally we may guess in a natural way, that great Calamities are hereby threatned to most Countries of Europe, by Sicknesses, Famines or Depopulations, which 'ere many Years pass are like to waste

waste and consume many of its Inhabitants, if God in mercy prevent not. Inter potentissimos bujus mundi principes, ruptis fæderibus, capitales inimicitiæ nascentur, says my Author. The learned Aftrologers in all Ages, as Ptolemy, Junctine. Leovitius, Origanus, Maginus, &c. have observed notable Events to succeed great Eclipses, and Leovitius writing upon the like Eclipse, O Reges principes et magnates, (saith he) potissimum sub or a 50 vg, vos præ nimio æstu sudabitis, &c. Whether the Events was answerable or no in his Times let others judge; this is certain that this Eclipse was more famous. than that which befel in his Time, for it was a great Eclipse, and in the fign regent of England the north and east Part, Germany, France, Sweedland, Denmark, Scotland, Holland and Zealand, Portugal, Cilicia and Galicia, &c. and ascend. ing thro' the 10th House called of Astrologers, Domus Magnatum, &c et Calum, Mars solus habet, why then may not this Eclipse forshew also rarissimos, ingentes atque improvisis Effectus, wonderful great and unexpected Effects to come in the near succeeding Times, and of this our own Experience may inform us, if we will but with an impartial Eye confider the remarkable great Eclipses of the Sun that have happened in this Century, even in our own Times: I will tell you when they were, viz. the first in April 1715, the second in May 1724, the third in February 1737, the fourth in July 1748, and your own Reading or Knowledge may inform you. what were the Effects they produced, which I think might forewarn and forearm us too; a very few Years will produce wonders, but what they will be in particular; nulli Mortalium fatis perspectum judico, I think no mortal Man can foresee. and so I conclude my Discourse with the first Aphorism of Ptolemy. A te et a scientia, from thyself and science, for its impossible that the Artist should foresee the particular Idea of Things; neither can sense perceive a particular, but a general Notion of the fenfible matter, whereby he ought in these Things to use conjecture, for none but one inspired can predict particulars, and fo much for these Eclipses.

Take I' th' Conclusion what I've more to say,
If all were right none would their trust betray.

# A Continuation of the Genethliacal Astrology from my last.

Verily concluded that either the Sun or Moon must be givers of Life, and that the rays of the malefic Stars must be the abscissors or destroyers of Life: but how or by what measure of directions must be my Business now to enquire into; and in so doing I shall diffent wholly from the method now practised; for I affirm that all the Stars from the time of the nativity in their own certain peculiar motions and in good order, are moved as well in the Zodiac as in the World, from the same moment of time; yet in a just proportion of their motions. As for Example, Jupiter in the nativity of a certain Person is in 4° 3' in Cancer in the following days, from the day and hour of the nativity he will be removed as much under the the Primum Mobile, as in his own diurnal motion. In like manner they will make them meeting as well as the promittors, therefore it is without reason to constitute any Planet as we please immoveable, either in the Zodiack or the World, when really it is moved thro' the fituation of these places as well one as another. For all proportions which are found to predict accidents, are either very false or repugnant to reason; it is in vain to direct the Ascendent to the Stars, or the Planets to him, when those lines which are brought to the division are imaginary and operate nothing at all, except there be fome body of equal distance with another, and their presence may be delayed, to receive the Aspect of another luminous Body, that may give power to this to transmit its Light even to us. Hence there is no directions of the Houses really, though they may seem apparent in our directions, because the Ascendent is directed, not because the space of Life may be known

from

from itself or something else, but in division of time forward, in respect of the Sun's course or of the diurnal motion; but also these directions of the Medium Cæli and others of the Planets are taken away both in respect of the Equator and the Zodiac, according to true and natural motion, and as the Stars are every where really moved, and from these rules all

Aspects of every fort are known.

Again the direction of the Moon itself is against Reason and natural motion, to which they attribute 1 deg. of Longitude. under the Primum Mobile for every Year, as they give to the Sun himself. Without doubt the Moon sometimes goes 14 deg. more or less in any Day, in the same space of Time that the Sun goes about 1 degree; how therefore shall we believe this direction. But these things are to be found out and concluded to the agreement of these Events, but seeing they are generally false, they have made infinite other causes, till they have found some things to answer their Prognostics; that which is most ridiculous, they have cut off Life by some square or opposition of the malefics to the Ascendent or Medium Cæli, or even from some other Planet although not malefic; but of the directions which are called secondary by Placidus de Titis (seeing they are rather primary and the only) have been something explained, not found out by his most ingenious wit, feeing they have remained from all Antiquity, and Julius Firmicus had a glimpse of them, as may be perceiv'd by the geniture of Lolianus, for he writes that the benefits of Jupiter do sometimes fail in former Parts, because from this in the third (to wit from the nativity) the Moon being in Leo and full of Light, dashed against the rays of Mars by oppofition, and he explains this in another place more clearly, and in like manner Origanus in his Nat. Astron. Memb. 4. chap. ii. treats of the same, therefore it is no wonder if we have so few of them, feeing that confumit omnia tempus, and fo no more at this Time.

A friendly caution here take from my Pen, Beware of some prevaricating Men. Cavendi Opportunitas non est omittendu.

I. Of the Winter Quarter,

WHICH begins on Friday the 21st Day of December 1764, at 36 minutes past 6 in the Morning apparent Time, when 10 degrees of Libra culminates, and 10 degrees of Sagittary ascends; the Sun in the ascendent in sextile to Mars in the 3d, and the Moon in the 12th; going from the square of Mars, and applying to the Body of the Sun, and Mercury is hastning to a square of Jupiter, and Saturn and Venus have lately been in opposition from Taurus and Scorpio. being fixed figns; these are the Aspects, my judgment from them is, that the general Affairs of Nations, the common People or subjects of many Princes in transmarine Parts generally diffatisfied, their Princes much impoverished, many confiderations or fecret confultations are on foot how to meliorate their miserable Condition, but no persect expedient can as yet be found out, or yet any sensible agreement in the resolution of those, who strongly endeavour by all art and industry to reconcile Differences, or to give conclusion to the lamentable affictions of many Parts of Europe, and her distressed Inhabitants. Oh happy England, be thankful for thy Plenty for thy present Peace, for all the mercies of a gracious God bestowed upon thee; pray for his Majesty's long life and Reign. Few or not many of our animadversions belong to us this Year, and so we would be generally understood. As for the Inclination of the Weather, there being no strong configurations to the contrary, it is for the most part signified by Venus and the Moon, their Application, to the superiour and inferior Planets. Venus for the most part fignifies moist Weather, Rain, Snow, fleety Weather, and not harmful to Mankind.

#### II. The Spring Quarter.

HIS pleafant Quarter commences on Wednesday March 20, at 27 minutes past 8 in the Morning, apparent Time; when to degrees of Gemini ascend, and 5 degrees of Aquarius culminates. At this ingress we find Venus Mercury and the Moon in the 11th, in trine to Jove, the Sun near to the cusp of the 12th, and Saturn and Mars conjoined in Taurus, an earthly fign in the 12th, also the Moon by Separation and Application is conjoined with them all; therefore it is a very active ingress; Jupiter is in square to the great Conjunction in Aries, and the great solar Eclipse was in the degree of the same Conjunction. And it has been diligently observed by the learned in all Ages, that great conjunctions in Cardinal Signs never pass over without prodigious Effects, and I am of Opinion, that its Effects are in being, and will not be extirpated for many Years to come, being reiterated by the late famous folar Eclipse. Many and considerable are the Transactions in different Parts of the World, and many politick Heads are now at Work; and it looks something like a new War breaking out, which we have little or nothing to do with. There will be found (I fear ) cross Doings in the World, viz. in some Country's remote from us, being now concerting what Measures to take. 'Tis to be fear'd some of the Grandees will exert their Powers to do mischief, where it will be of little use to themselves, but God is many ways favourable to us of Great Brittain, but more particularly to the Merchants and trading Men of the Nation, who feem to be in a flourishing and prosperous Condition, yet the Conjunction of the two Infortunes feems to overthwart fome of their Defigns; I shall further observe from the Figure of the ingress in general, that we are likely to enjoy our Habitations in a peaceable and friendly Order, except as I faid before, our Difference in our Opinions diffurb our Peace; for many are the Enemies of our Church: yet I hope neither Rome nor Geneva, nor both together, will ever be able to prevail against her. She is a Medium between two Extreams. being neither guilty of the superstition of the one, nor the Sovenly indecent behaviour of the other; she is built on such a Rock, that the Gates of Hell can never prevail against her, so to conclude,

Come let us all unite, and let my Muse now sing, To pray God keep the Church, and bless the King.

#### III. The Summer Quarter,

HICH begins at fuch Time as the Sun mounts the Carleffal Crab or fign Cancer, which this Year is on the 21st of June, at 51 minutes past 6 in the Morning, when 14 degrees of Aries is on the Midheaven, and 6 degrees of Leo alcending, with Saturn and Mercury and the Sun and Venus in the 11th, Jupiter and Mars upon the cusp of the 12th, the Moon on the Ascendent applying to the sextile of Mercury; and thus are the Heavens posited at this ingress. This Quarter produces much Variety in the Aspects of the Planets, as may be seen by the Ephemeris itself, among the roft three Eclipses, two of the Sun, and one of the Moon. (though one only fearce visible to us) and upon these Considerations some very remarkable Occurrences should be carried on throughout Europe at leaft, and of notable Remark, and from whence we may observe, how whirling and unstable, are the pinacles and battlements of the most potent Empires, and how flippery is the top of fickle Fortune. 'Tis a great Pity to see the Curtain drawn between just deserving Persons and Preferment, and we may daily verifie by our own Experience, that those who have been bad enough by their unworthy and dishonest Actions, even their own inselicity has precipitated their Fates; and sometimes again those that have acted their Parts with much Integrity, even their own Merits, have been their ruin; most Men are industrious to promote their own Interest and Advantage, and some use their Wealth as Anglers do their Fish, to bait their Hooks to catch more. 'Tis Almighty God only that is the common Friend as well as the Father of all Men.

#### IV. Of the Autumnal Quarter.

HICH commences on Sunday the 22d of September at 20 minutes past 8 at Night, when 7 degrees of Gemini is on the eastern finitor, and 3 degrees of Aquarius culminates; Jupiter in the 4th, Saturn on the cusp of the Ascendent, and the Moon in the 9th going from a square of the Sun, to the square of Mercury and trine of Mars; thus are the Stars postered at this ingres, and more passive than any of the rest, which makes me say, that now no great Matters may be expected, or nothing but what we have already experimented; the Course of this World is full of Change, and I.t our Course of Life be what it will, many of us may

expect milery Enough. I advise all People to forbear expressing their distiffaction in any Point, or medling with Matters out of their Sphere, thereby endangering their Persons, Families and Estates. A wise Man is always more ready to hear than to speak, we read of none that ever were andone by hearing, but thousands by speaking. It is the sweetest revenge to forget an injury. Whoever observes the World, and the Order of it, will find all the Motions in it to be only a vicissitude of falling and rising, nothing extinguished, and even those Things which seem to us to person, are in truth but changed.
