## Of the Eclipfes for the Year, 1765 .

THERE will be fix Eclipfes to the Inhabitants of this
Globe, four of the Sun, and two of the Moon, they will happen in the following order.

The firft is an invifible Eclipfe of the Sun, on February the 19th, at 11 at Night.

The fecond is of the Moon, on March the 7th, at I o'Clock in the Afternoon, and therefore invifible.

The third is of the Sun, on March the 21 ft , at 1 in the Afternoon, but invifible alfo.

The fourth is a fmall Eclipfe of the Sun, on the 16 th of Auguft, at 4 in the Afternoon; and becaufe it is fo fmall, for in the moft northern parts of Europe, as at Mofoow in Rufia, St Peter.jourg, and at Stockbolm in Sewedeland, where it is the moft vifible, there are fcarcely 2 digits eclipfed; therefore I fhall not trouble myfelf or my readers with any thing more about it.

The fifth is of the Moon, on the 3 oth of Augult, at 4 in the Afternoon, and invifible alfo.

The fixth is of the Sun, on September 15 th, at 5 in the Morning, and invifible alfo: thus much for this Year's Eclipfes.

But as I faid in my laft Years Almanack, that the general effects of the folar Eclipfe, which was on the ift Day of April 1764, would be apparent in the Years 1765 and 1766 , I fhall according to my promife, give you a more particular Judgment of that Eclipfe. Now accordiug to the precepts of Aftrology, great Damages do environ and befall fuch Ferfons, eipecially as are fignified by Sol; and we all know he reprefents no mean ones, but Men in Authority, as Kings, Princes. Governours of eminent Places, $\mathcal{E}^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. As he was then darkned and eclipfed near to his Exaltation, near the Culmen Cæli, and greateft fummity of his Altitude, fo aftrologically may we deduce this Conjecture ; viz. that it prefageth to them an Adumbration and Eclipfing of their Honours and Dignities, even in that point of Time, when they are in their height of Honour, and it likewife feems to prenote that 2 Company

a Company of cunning and fubtile pharifaical Hypocrites, thall arife in Sheep's Cloathing, who by their infinuating and crafty wiles, fhall bewitch the ignorant, and deceive the very Elect too, were it poffible ; if Authority in Time do not fupplant them. Such I fay muft come, and never more likely than now. Oar bleffed Saviour himfelf, forewarns us of them, in Matth. xxiv. 23, 24. Mark xiii. 21. Tunc, fo quis vobis dixerit, ecce, bic Cbrifus, aut bic, ne credatis, excita. buntur enim pleuido Cbriffi, et pfeudo propbetce, et edent Jigna magna $\mathrm{E}^{\circ}$ miracula, ita ut feducant (ut fieri polyit) etiam elecios. Certainly we may gather from many Places of holy writ, that thefe are the very Times there fpoken of, which will infallibly come to pafs; yet I verily believe that after theie things are fulfilled, there- Thall immediately fucceed a Goiden Age, wherein the diverfe Forms of religious and politic Government fhall be changed, and made conformably to the will of God; but left I fhould digrefs, I muft turn into the way again, and Speak more particularly of this famous Eclipfe. Sol cum laborare, fays my Author, vivus fuerit in denaris fecundo arietis, regum carcerem, et marorem, aut mortis periculum, arborumque fructiferarum corruptionem, ac terne najcentium, putredinem: When the Sun fhall fuffer Eclipfe in the fecond face of Aries, it portends imprifonment and grief to fome King, or peril of his death, alfo Corruption of Fruit Trees and rottennefs of Thinge, growing upon the Face of the Earth. Fiunt in mundo multa incommoda, quando erit in uno menje, utriufque Luminaris Eclipfos pracipuè in bis locis quibus eft fignificatio corum fpecialis: Hermes in centiloqui 53 enunciato: In the World many evils will happen, when in one Month there fhall be an Eclipfe of both Luminaries, chiefly in thofe Places fubject to the figns they are in; we had then both Luminaries eclipfed in one Month, and both vifible too, and therefore it's much to be fear'd we fhall, 'ere their Effects determine, fee frefh troubles and divifions, and great differences in Opinions; Neighbour fill murmuring again爪 Neighbour, and Brother againit Brother, et quid non ; generally we may guefs in a natural way, that great Calamities are hereby threatned to moft Countries of Europe, by Sickneffes, Famines or Depopulations, which 'ere many Years pais are like to wafte

wate and confume many of its Inhabitants, if God in mercy prevent not. Inter potentifimos bujus mundi principes, ruptis foederibus, capitales inimicitice nafcentur, fays my Author. The learned Aftrologers in all Ages, as Ptolemy, Junctire, Leovitius, Origanus, Maginus, Eic. have oblerved notable Events to fucceed great Eclipfes, and Leovitius writing upon the like Eclipfe, O Reges principes ot magnates, (faith he) porifimum fub or $\bumpeq$ on vs, vos pre nimio costur fudabitis, E $c$, Whether the Events was anfwerable or no in his Times let others judge ; this is certain that this Eclipfe was more famous, than that which befel in his Time, for it was a great Eclipfe, and in the fign regent of England the north and eaft Part, Germany; France, Sweedland, Denmark, Scotland, Holland and Zealand, Portugal, Cilicia and Galicia, Egc. and afcending thro' the roth Houfe called of Aftologers, Domus Mag. natum, E8" C et Crelum, Mars folus babet, why then may not this Eclipfe forfhew alfo rarifimos, ingentes atque impliovifis Effectus, wonderful great and unexpecied Effects to come in the near fucceeding Times, and of this our own Experience may inform us, if we will Lut with an impartial Eyc con. fider the remarkable great Eclipfes of the Sun that have happened in this Century, even in our own Times: I will tell you when they were, viz. the firlt in April 1715, the fecond in May 1724, the third in February 1737, the fourth in July 1748, and your own Reading or Knowiedge may inform you, what were the Fffects they produced, which I. think might forewarn and forearm us too; a very few Years will produce wonders, but what they will be in particular; malli Mortalium fatis perppectum judico, I think no mortal Man can forefee, and fo I concluce my Difcourfe with the firf Aphorifm of Ptolemy. A te et a fcientiá, from thyfelf and fcience, for its impoffible that the Artit thould forefee the particular Idea of Things; reither can fenfe perceive a particular, but a general Notion of the fenfible matter, whereby he ought in thefe Things to ufe conjecture, for none but one infpired can pre. diet particulars, and fo much for thefe Eclipfes.

## A Continuation of the Genetbliacal Aftrology from my laft.

IVerily concluded that either the Sun or Moon muft be givers of Life, and that the rays of the malefic Stars mult be the abfcifors or deftroyers of Life: but how or by what meafure of direations murt be my Bufnefs now to enquire into; and in fo doing I fhall diffent wholly from the method now practifed; for I affrm that all the Stars from the time of the nativity in their own certain peculiar motions and in good order, are moved as well in the Zodiac as in the World, from the fame moment of time; yet in a juft proportion of their motions. As for Example, Jupiter in the nativity of a certain Perfon is in $4^{\circ} 3^{\prime}$ in Cancer in the following days, from the day and hour of the nativity he will be removed as much under the the Primum Mobile, as in his own diurnal motion. In like manner they will make them meeting as well as the promittors, therefore it is without reafon to conflitute any Planet as we pleafe immoveable, either in the Zodiack or the Worid, when really it is moved thro' the fituation of thefe places as well one as another. For all proportions which are found to predict accidents, are either very falfe or repugnant to reafon; it is in vain to direct the Afcendent to the Stars, or the Planets to him, when thofe lines which are brought to the divifion are imaginary and operate nothing at all, exceft there be fome body of equal diftance with another, and their prefence may be delayed, to receive the Afpect of another luminous Body, that may give power to this to tranfmit its Light even to us. Hence there is no direations of the Houfes really, though they may feem apparent in our direstions, becaufe the Afcerident is directed, not becaufe the fpace of Life may be known

from itfelf or fomething elfe, but in divifion of time forward, in refpect of the Sun's courfe or of the diurnal motion; but alfo thefe directions of the Medium Creli and others of the Planets are taken away both in refpect of the Equator and the Zodiac, according to true and natural motion, and as the Stars are every where really moved, and from thefe rules all Alpęts of every fort are known.
Again the direction of the Moon itfelf is againft Reafon and natural motion, to which they attribute 1 deg. of Longitude; under the Primum Mobile for every Year, as they give to the Sun himfelf. Without doubt the Moon fometimes goes 14 deg. more or lefs in any Day, in the fame fpace of Time that the Sun goes about I degree; how therefore fhall we believe this direction. But thefe things are to be found out and concluded to the agreement of thefe Events, but feeing they are generally falfe, they have made infinite other caufes, till they have found fome things to anfiwer their Prognoltics; that which is mofl ridiculous, they have cut (ff Life by fome fquare or oppofition of the malefics to the Afcerdent or Medium Cæli, or even from fome other Planet although not malefic; but of the directions which are called fecondary by Placidus de Titis (feeing they are rather primary and the only) have been fomething explained, not found out by his moft ingenious wit, feeing they have remained from all Antiquity, and Julius Firmicus had a glimpfe of them, as may be perceiv'd by the geniture of Lolianus, for he writes that the benefits of Jupiter do fometimes fail in former Parts, becaufe from this in the third (to wit from the nativity) the Moon being in Leo and full of Light, dafted againt the rays of Mars by oppofition, and he explains this in another place more clearly, and in like manner Origanus in his Nat. Aftron. Memb. 4. chap. ii. treats of the fame, therefore it is no wonder if we have fo few of them, feeing that confumit onnnia tempus, and fo no more at this Time.

Oh happy England, be thankful for thy Plenty for thy prefent Peace, for all the mercies of a gracious God beftowed upon thee; pray for his Majefty's long life and Reign. Few or not many of our animadverfions belong to us this Year, and fo we would be generally underflood. As for the Inclination of the Weather, there being no ftrong configurations to the contrary, it is for the moft part fignified by Venus and the Moon, their Application, to the fuperiour and inferior Planets. Venus for the moft part fignifies moift Weather, Rain, Snow, fleety Weather, and not harmful to Mankind.

## II. The Spring Quarter.

TH IS pleafont Quarter commences on Wednefday Mar:h 20, at 27 minutes paft 8 in the Morning, apparerit Time; when 10 degrees of Gemini aftend, and 5 degrees of Aquarias cuinsirates. At this ingrefs we find Venus Mercury and the Moon in the rith, in trise to Jove, the Sun near to the cufp of the 12th, and Saturn and Mars conj ined in Taurus, an earthly fign in the 12th, alfo the Moon by Separation and Application is conjoined with them all; therefore it is a very active ingrefs ; Jupiter is in fquare to the great Conjunction in Aries, and the great fular Eclipfe was in the degree of the fame Conjunction. And it has been diligently obferved by the learned in all Ager, that great conjunctions in Cardinal Sigers never pafs over without prodigious Effects, and 1 am of Opision, that its Effets are in being, and will not be extirpated for many Years to come, being reiteraeed by the late famous folar Eclipfe. Many and confiderable are the Tranfaetions in different Parts of the World, and many politick Heads are now at Work; and it looks fomething like a new War breaking sut, which we have little or nothing to do with. There will be found (I fear) crofs DJ. ings in the World, viz. in fome Country's remote from us, being now concerting what Meafures to take. 'Tis to be fear'd Come of the Grandees wil exert their Powers to do mifchief, where it will be of little ufe to themfelves, but God is many ways favourable to us of Great Brittain, but more particularly to the Merchants and trading Men of the Nation, who feem to be in a flourifhing and profperous Condition, yet the Conjunction of the two Infortunes feems to overthwart forme of their Defigns; I hall further obferve from the Figure of the ingrefs in general, that we are likely to enjoy our Habitations in a peaceable and friendly Order, except as I faid befure, our Dif. ference in our Opinions ditusb our Peace; for many are the Enemies of our Church: yet I hope neither Rome nor Geneva, nor both together, will ever be abie to prevail againft her. She is a Medium between two Extreame, being neither guilty of the fuperftition of the one, nur the fovenly indecent behavinur of the other; fhe is built on fuch a Rocik, that the Gates of Hell can never prevait againat her, fo to conclude,

## III. The Summer Quarter,

wH ICH begins at fuch Time as the Sun mount the Crefential Crab or figa Cancer, which this Year is on the 2 Ift of June, at 5I minutes pall 6 in the Morning, when 14 degrees of Aries is on the Mid. heaven, and 6 degrees of Leo atcending, with Saturn and Mercury and the Sun and Venus in the 14th, Jupiter and Mars upon the culp of the 12th, the Moon on the Afcendent applying to the fextile of Mercury; and thius are the Heavens pofited at th's ingrefs. This Quarter produces much Variety in the Afpects of the Planets, as may be feen by the Ephemeris itfelf, among the reft three Eclipies, two of the Sun, and one of the Moon, (th $u_{s} h$ one only farce vifible to us) and upon thefe Confiderations fome very remarkable Occurrences mould be curried on throughout Europe at leaft, and of notable Remark, and from whence we may obferve, how whirling and unfable, are the pinacles and battlements of the mof patent Empires, and how nippery is the top of fickle Fortune. 'Tis a great Pity to fee the Curtain drawn between juft deferving Perfons and Preferment, and we may daily verifie by our own Experience, that thofe who bave been bad enough by their unworthy and difhoneft Actions, even their own infelicity has precipitated their Fates; and fometimes again thofe that have aeted their Parts with much Integrity, even their own Merits, have been their ruin i moft Men are induitrious to promote their own Iniereft and Advantaze, and fome ufe their Wealth as Anglers do their Fifh, to bait their Hooks to catch more. 'Tis Almighty God oniy that is the common Friend as well as the Father of all Men,

Good Men from Viie, for love of Vitue run, But fear alone makes bad Men Vice to foun.
