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

HOWARD THURSTON

World's Master MAGICIAN

When Howard Thurston was a boy, living in Columbus, Ohio, he went to see a performance given by Alexander Herrmann, the greatest magician of that time. Fascinated by the magic of that great mystifier, young Thurston resolved that he would become a magician. Probably thousands of other boys had made that same resolution, and never kept it; but Howard Thurston persisted in his decision, and, today, he occupies the position which Herrmann held then.

The road to greatness is not an easy one, and the trials and struggles which Thurston encountered in his early career would fill a large sized volume. But he was undaunted in his purpose. He sought to introduce originality into his performances, and he invented a new and spectacular "Rising Card" trick with which he mystified Leon Herrmann, the nephew and successor of Herrmann the Great.

Combining this new creation with a repertoire of original card manipulations, Thurston entered vaudeville, and soon won fame and recognition. He made a tour of Europe, and gave special performances before a dozen rulers, including King Edward VII, President Loubet of France; the Emperor of Germany and the Czar of Russia.

Upon his return to America, Thurston decided to prepare a complete magical performance of his own and to make a world tour. He embarked with his company from San Francisco and traveled to Australia, where he completed the building of his apparatus and made his debut at the Palace Theatre, in Sydney. He received a tremendous ovation and his success was established. He toured Australia in triumph and then visited the Oriental countries: China, Japan, Indor China, Sumatra, Java, the Philippine Islands, Burma and India.


Thurston arrived in India in 1905 and astonished the natives with feats of magic that surpassed the fabled wonders of that land of mystery. He played to packed theatres in Calcutta, he appeared before many of the native rulers, and finally he toured the north

of India, giving his performances in a huge tent, as the theatres of the northern cities were in a dequate for his needs.

During the ten years of Howard Thurston's rise to fame, Harry Kellar had become the leading magician of the American stage. Word of Thurston's successful world tour had come to Kellar and he cable d Thurston asking him



Rawa Theatre, Agra, India. The Thurston Production Arriving by Caravan


to join the Kellar show. Thurston accepted the offer and returned to America. In May, 1908, at Ford's Opera House, in Baltimore, Kellar announced Thurston as his successor, and since that time Howard Thurston has been universally recognized as America's leading magician and the foremost magician in the world.

The uniform excellence of Mr. Thurston's performance is due to the fact that he is master of the smallest feats of sleight-of-hand and also of the largest illusions. His title, the "World's Master Magician," is not merely a name, it is an established fact. For twenty-three consecutive seasons he has toured America, presenting newer and greater illusions. His show has always been the greatest and most

spectacular of its kind. Built directly upon the Kellar show, it has been recognized as the premier magical performance for more than thirty years, and its actual inception occurred many years before.

The Thurston show is more than twice as large and spectacular as it was in 1908. Thurston now carries a company of more than thirty-five persons and his equipment fills three cars. Animals of many descriptions are used in the wonder show, the most notable being "Rajah", the roaring lion that he causes to instantly appear in the center of a brilliantly lighted stage. The cost of constructing a single illusion for the Thurston show would, in itself, build a small magical show. More than \$5,000 was expended in producing the "Vanishing Horse" illusion, which was one of the outstanding features of Thurston's spectacular performance.

Everyone who witnesses Mr. Thurston's performances marvels at the smoothness and regularity with which one new mystery follows another. This is due to the careful planning and exhaustive practice which is gone through before a new illusion is presented on the stage. Every moment of Thurston's show is adjusted to clock-like precision. The

variety of the performance requires an infinite amount of attention to detail and absolutely co-ordinated action on the part of the many assistants. The public expects the best, and for twenty years the Thurston show has given it.

The newest creations in magical art are being constantly added to Mr. Thurston's performance; yet the continuity of the show is never disturbed. This difficult task is accomplished by continually adding new tricks and illusions to replace older ones, so that each season a new series of marvels are exhibited before the public.

Every article used in the show has its regular place, so that the setting of the stage for an opening



night's performance is greatly simplified. The packing of the show after the closing night of an engagement is also systematized. It is sometimes necessary to have the paraphernalia packed and the cars loaded within an hour after the final curtain has dropped. The members of the company are trained for such emergencies, and they never fail in their duty.

The details of the Thurston show are many and remarkable, and they stand as a living proof of Mr. Thurston's versatile genius. The famous magician is a creator of illusions, a builder of apparatus, a systematic organizer and a theatrical producer. Those are his qualifications behind the scenes. Before the footlights he is an entertainer par excellence, the greatest magician of the present day. He has always appeared as a magician, he has won his fame as a magician, and he upholds his name as a magician.


During his boyhood days, Mr. Thurston attended the Mt. Hermon School and studied for the ministry. It was not until after his graduation that he finally decided to start on his career as a magician. In his school days he took an interest both in his studies and athletics, and he owes much of his success to that early training which produced in him both physical development and oratorical ability. During every moment that Mr. Thurston is on the stage the audience realizes that they are witnessing an entertainment given by a gentleman, and Mr. Thurston's genial personality and pleasing stage presence are the most important influence of his show.


One of Mr. Thurston's most unique performances was given in 1925, when he and his company appeared before President Coolidge in the White House. On that occasion Mr. Thurston borrowed the president's watch and apparently pounded it to pieces, but the watch was later discovered, uninjured, in a loaf of bread brought from the White House kitchen. Due to a mistake by one of the assistants, the trick came very nearly to an unfortunate ending that would have ruined the valuable time-piece beyond the aid of Thurston's magic. Fortunately, Mr. Thurston discovered the mistake in time, and, through his presence of mind, brought the trick to a happy conclusion.

Mr. Thurston regards his performance at the White House as one of the outstanding triumphs of his long career. As a momento of the important occasion he possesses a large photograph of the president, upon which is written:

"To Howard Thurston, in behalf of his daughter Jane.

--Calvin Coolidge."

So, in the years that have passed, and in the years that are to come, Howard Thurston will be recognized and remembered by the title which he has richly deserved — "The World's Master Magician."



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
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THURSTON'S MAGIC CIRCLES THE GLOBE


As a crowning achievement to this world-wide success, the magic of the master magician has been carried to the West Indies, Central America, and South America; and now the name of Thurston is synonymous with magic throughout the entire Western hemisphere. Then he went to Europe, and appeared in all of the principal countries on the continent.

So when he returned to America, he had acquired great experience in foreign countries, and a tour of the world became his ambition.

The World Tour began in 1905 and ended in 1906. The total distance traveled was approximately 40,000 miles; for Thurston circles through Australia and journeyed extensively in India. The winding course of the white line shows the great distance covered.

Thurston had planned to continue his tour to South Africa; but in order to join the famous Kellar in America, he shortened the trip, returning home by way of Northern Africa, where he visited Egypt and other Mediterranean countries.





THURSTON INVENTIONS BENEFIT HUMANITY

Master Magician Spares No Effort in Devising Methods of Saving Life-Gives His Knowledge and Creative Genius to His

Fellow Citizens

THE WHITE HOUSE WASHINGTON February 6, 1913.

My dear Sir:

In the President's behalf, permit me to acknowledge the receipt, through Mr. Langdon Moore of this city, of Latters Patent No. 1,051,649, relating to Life Saving Devices designed to promote the greater safety of life at sea, issued to the Government of the United States, it having first been adjudged that you were entitled to a patent for the invention, and your rights in the premises having thereupon been voluntarily assigned to the Government. I desire also to acknowledge the worthy intention and humanitarian purpose which prompted you to dedicate your invention to the public use.

President William Howard Taft sent the above letter to Howard Thurston accepting his device for saving lives at sea. The creation of magical illusions requires a thorough knowledge of science and mechanics. The planning of new and deceptive illusions makes inventive genius necessary.

Thurston's keen knowledge of human nature is an indication of his human sympathy; and greater even than his love of magic is his desire to help mankind. In times of great need, he has devoted his entire inventive genius to the aid of his fellowbeings, without hope of gain or thought of reward.

In preparing new illusions, Thurston has invented many mechanical appliances, and has discovered new mechanical principals which he has protected by patents. It is also necessary for him to keep many of his methods secret, for it is his business to mystify the public.

But whenever he has seen the possibility of using one of his inventions in a way that will bring human benefit, and save life, he has immediately devoted it to that purpose.

As a result, he can point to several notable achievments which he has accomplished; and he has gained recognition for his work from the highest places, and on several occasions. Following the sinking of the Steamship Titanic in 1913, Thurston invented and patented a life-saving device which experts proclaimed to be a notable achievement in the prevention of marine disasters. Upon granting of the patent papers, the famous magician presented his invention to the United States government; an action which was recognized by President Taft.

During the World War, when the greatest need was for inventions to protect troops and civilians, Thurston adapted his magical talents to the creation of elusive devices that would completely deceive the eyes of the enemy.


On the day that the United States declared war against Germnay, Thurston offered his services to the government. He stated that he could make ships invisible at sea; that he could transform a battery of field guns into a row of trees; and accomplish other startling illusions.

So miraculous did these statements seem that officials did not believe them possible. They were laid aside for later consideration; and in the meantime, the Allied Powers developed the science of camouflage, which embodied certain of Thurston's principles, and was used extensively throughout the war.

It is a certain fact that Thurston could produce camouflage effects far more deceptive than any that were in actual war-time use. His ability to deceive the eye is manifested in astonishing effects with elephants, horses, lions, automobiles, pianos, etc., which he vanishes and produces on a brightly lighted stage, with the ease with which he handles a rabbit or canary bird.

In his now famous illusion, "Buried Alive", Thurston employs hitherto unknown principles of air conservation which are fully protected and patented by himself. Since the disaster to the submarine S-4, Thurston has offered to divulge these secrets to the Naval Department at Washington, in order that in the future, men entombed on submarines may make use of this knowledge to prolong the air supply and thus greatly increase the possibilities of rescue.

These humanitarian actions of Howard Thurston reveal the kindliness and human understanding of his nature; and these are the true secrets of how he has gained success and public esteem.






The Living Burial, as presented on the stage by Thurston.

Magic in the Secret Service

ONE evening, in the last summer of the war, Mrs. Thurston, my daughter Jane and I were sitting down to dinner in our home on Long Island, when an armed motor car drove up to the house and a tall, handsome young man in the uniform of a lieutenant appeared at the door, demanding to see me. He entered the room at my invitation, and I noticed that he was in a sort of breathless state of anxiety.

"Mr. Thurston, I have an urgent message for you. How quickly can you put a few tricks in your pocket and leave with me?" He came to the point at once.

Supposing it to be a request to appear at a hospital or some war benefit, I told him I could leave immediately after dinner.

"There's no time, Mr. Thurston," he urged. "Every minute is precious. Please hurry."

As he spoke he handed me a card with two words scrawled on it, reading "Hurry. Dennis."

Dennis I knew intimately; a clever amateur magician, who was then engaged in wartime secret-service work for the Government, and who is today an international detective of note. It was his first name he had signed to the card and it is as Dennis we will now speak of him. Obviously it was a matter of great importance. The curt message, the licutenant's distressed manner and the purring of the motor in the armed car outside, all spoke of extreme urgency.

"One moment and I will be with you," I said to the young officer as I left the table and started on a hurried round-up of a few properties—a pack of cards, several extra handkerchiefs and a live rabbit, all of which I thrust into a coat pocket. In less than five minutes we were speeding in the direction of New York. It was not until we were seated in the car that I found time to ponder over this curious happening. I plied the licutenant with questions, but he knew no more than I did; his instructions had been simply to get me to New York with all possible haste.

Along the Long Island roads and through the heavier traffic of the intervening towns we traveled at a speed which I momentarily expected to end in disaster. But we reached our destination safely. As we drew up in front of a prominent club I glanced at my watch and noted that it had taken less than half an hour to make the trip. We entered the club and found Dennis waiting for us in the lobby. He seized my arm and led me over toward the heavily portiered entrance of another room. Through an opening in the curtains I saw a company of about a hundred guests, in evening clothes, at dinner. A young woman was entertaining them with a song.

"Listen," whispered Dennis, pointing to one of the diners, a heavy-set man with a beard. "Do you see that man? In his right inside coat pocket he has a long envelope. I have to have that envelope in ten minutes' time, and I depend on you to get it for me. I'll be waiting here. Ten minutes!"

The girl finished singing, Dennis gave me a gentle shove through the portieres, and I found myself in the banquet hall. Somebody was addressing the diners.

"Now, gentlemen, we shall have the pleasure of watching Mr. Howard Thurston, the magician," I heard a voice saying.

THERE was no time for speculation ' now. Feeling in my pocket to make sure that the rabbit was still there, I made my way between the tables to the platform and at once started a series of card manipulations. My only thought was of Dennis' last whispered words. Ten minutes! In ten minutes I must deliver to him the mysterious envelope which was the keynote of this strange errand. I spotted my man, stepped down into the audience and walked toward him. I had formed my plan of action.

"Will you select a card, sir?" I asked a man sitting to his left. "Any one you like."

The card was chosen and replaced in the pack, which was shuffled. Then I addressed the bearded man.

"You sir, I believe, are sitting on this gentleman's card—the queen of hearts," I remarked.

He arose, smiling pleasantly. Sure enough, there was the queen of hearts on his chair. He made as though to resume his seat, but I interfered. I had purposely maneuvered him into a standing position, and there I must keep him until I had either succeeded or failed in this mission. "I beg your pa.don, there are more cards about your person," I interposed, at the same time producing handfuls of cards from his beard, his hair and his coat collar. The audience was laughing heartily, and he seemed much amused, and wholly unsuspicious.

The big moment was at hand; and now I launched on a series of swift movements which were to be the climax of my efforts. I could feel the envelope in his coat pocket.

"What's this?" I exclaimed. "It seems to be alive."

With one hand I lifted the wiggling rabbit from his coat collar; with the other I filched the envelope from his pocket and concealed it in my own clothes. The whole operation took not more than a second. I turned from him, bowed to the audience and quickly made my way from the hall. No one had suspected anything. Dennis was waiting for me at the designated spot. I handed the envelope to him.


"A thousand thanks, Thurston," he whispered. "This envelope contains valuable information which the Government wants; but for reasons I can't explain now the authorities do not wish to arrest that man." With that he was gone, and for obvious reasons I left the club as soon as possible. Three days later I met Dennis. He then told me that the envelope contained plans for blowing up one of our ships.

My Performance at the White House

By HOWARD THURSTON

While playing at the Shubert-Belasco Theater in Washington, we arranged to give a special performance for President Coolidge. A stage thirty feet square was built in sections and set up in the East Room of the White House. A corps of assistants and myself worked from ten o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon getting the place in readiness.

A few days before the performance, I learned that the President had just been presented with a beautiful watch by the Massachusetts Legislature. I then decided to present an unusual experiment which I had not performed for many years. From the description furnished I procured a copy the next day, and on cursory inspection it was far from being a poor imitation. The chief difference lay in the fact that the works of the imitation watch were in a deplorable condition of wreckage.

The guests were the first to arrive and were ushered to their seats by two colored butlers. When Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge entered, the entire party arose and remained standing until they were seated in the special chairs just in front of the stage. Then I nodded to Fred Dorn, my musical director, and the music started.

The performance had been in progress for about an hour when I stepped in front of the President and said, "Ladies and gentlemen, I shall now attempt a very special experiment that I presented before the Amir of Afghanistan twenty years ago.

"Will some gentleman kindly lend me his watch?"

Instantly six of the men guests offered their watches. I looked the President in the eye and said,—"I have said this is a very special trick. I should like to use a very special watch."

"I understand, Mr. Thurston," the President said, handing me his watch.

"Now let it be plainly seen," I resumed, "that I do not touch the watch."

Watching the Wrong Watch

I called for Jay Klink, one of my cleverest assistants, who had been with me for twelve years. Jay brought a silk bag, attached to a handle, and into this the President dropped his watch. I directed Jay to let one of the ladies take the watch from the bag and look at it. Mrs. Stearns, who sat three seats from the President, complied with the request. "You are sure you have the President's watch?" I asked.

"Oh, yes," Mrs. Stearns answered without hesitation, and she dangled it before Mr. Coolidge's eyes. He nodded approvingly, and I congratulated myself on having obtained such a fine duplicate. Mrs. Stearns laid the watch on a square piece of iron which I had placed on the table.

In my right hand I held a heavy hammer, which I poised menacingly over the watch.

"It will be necessary to mark the watch slightly for identification," I confided to the audience. "I shall be careful not to injure it."

Then I asked Mrs. Coolidge if she would kindly have a loaf of bread or any other object large enough to contain the watch brought from the kitchen. The order was given. I raised the hammer and counted: "One."

"One."

A tall man who had been standing to one side and whom I had previously judged to be a secret-service agent walked over to the table, took a good look at the watch and then glanced sharply at the President, who had resumed resting his chin on his right hand. If it was his wish to have the President intercede he was doonged to disappointment. Mr. Coolidge ignored the interruption. But I did not.

"I beg your pardon, sir, this is a very delicate experiment and I trust you will not do anything to unnerve me," was my mild protest. Again I raised the hammer and counted: "Two."

There was not a sound in the room; not a soul stirred. It dawned on me that the suspense of this audience was the most profound I had ever experienced in the many years I have been performing. I asked Mrs. Coolidge about the bread.

"It is some distance to the pantry, Mr. Thurston," she replied. "The butler will be here presently."

The secret-service man took another step forward as I raised the hammer for the third time. There was no mistaking the fact that he scented a catastrophe.

"Should there by any chance be an accident I must hold you responsible," I warned him.

Then, taking a firm grip, I droned the last number of the count: "Three."

My right arm swung back to bring the hammer down on the watch with crushing effect. But at the apex of the swing my wrist was seized in a viselike grip. It was Jay Klink who had interfered. His face was white and drawn, his voice trenmbled as he said in subdued tone but loud enough for everyone to hear:

"You've got the wrong watch!"

A Very Narrow Escape

Quick as a flash, I realized what had happened. Jay had made a mistake. He had forgotten a simple part of the trick which would have changed the President's watch for the duplicate, and Mrs. Stearns had taken the President's watch out of the bag instead of the duplicate! No wonder Mr. Coolidge had nodded in approval when she had dangled it before his eyes; no wonder the secret-service man had displayed such concern after his inspection of it. The watch I had been about to send to its doom was President Coolidge's own watch. Good Lord, what a providential escape! But it was an escape, and now my business was to slip out of the predicament created by Jay's frenzied warning. The audience had heard that.

"Jay says he heard one of the audience say I had the wrong watch," I told them. Then I lifted the table and placed it within the President's reach.

"Is that not your watch, Mr. President?" I asked in an injured tone. At this moment Jay slipped the duplicate watch into my right hand.

Mr. Coolidge lifted the watch from the table and inspected it carefully. There could be no mistake about it being his own property, and he nodded an affirmative answer to my question. I handde him a piece of tissue paper and requested him to wrap his watch in it. While helping him to do this, I substituted the imitation for the real watch, and as he laid the duplicate on the table I secretly passed his own to Jay, who carried it backstage and placed it in the loaf of bread, which had been prepared beforehand. No one suspected that I had made this change; the audience was more certain than ever that it was President Coolidge's watch which lay on the iron slab.

"Now that there can be no question about this being the President's watch I shall proceed," I informed them. At my count of two the butler appeared with the loaf of bread and placed it on a table directly in front of Mrs. Coolidge. "Three."

The Proof in the Pudding

The hammer descended with a whang. The casing of the watch fell apart, the works flew in all directions. Somebody uttered a barely audible cry of alarm, and I could sense that others were holding their breath, so tense had the performance become by reason of the unexpected happenings which had marked it. I shot a glance at the President. He hadn't moved a muscle; his chin still rested in his hand; his keen blue eyes looked into mine, as much as to say, "I don't believe it!" He was the calmest person in the room. I gazed dejectedly at the scattered fragments of the watch, then turned to the secret-service man.

"I told you not to interfere. The fault is yours," I protested. Gathering the broken pieces slowly to-

Gathering the broken pieces slowly together, I placed them in a piece of paper while the audience looked on in silence.

I turned to Mrs. Coolidge and said, "I shall do my best to rectify this miserable catastrophe." Then I "vanished" the paper and its contents and, handing Mrs. Coolidge a knife, asked her to cut the loaf of bread.

"Please be careful, Mrs. Coolidge," I directed.

The President took her arm and said, "Yes, dear, be careful."

It was his first spoken assurance that the watch would be returned safely. Mrs. Coolidge opened the loaf, the President received his watch, I^{*} still have my reputation and the Government continued to function.

THURSTON'S EASY POCKET TRICKS

In preparing this collection of easy pocket tricks, great care has been taken to select those items which can be performed by anyone, with no previous knowledge of magic.

Each trick is clearly explained, with special drawings that make it easy to understand; and the instructions are thorough in every detail. None of the tricks require sleight-of-hand or special apparatus. They can all be performed anywhere, at any time, and are suitable to all occasions.

The student will experience little difficulty in choosing enough tricks to form an interesting program of impromptu magic, with which he can entertain and mystify his friends and acquaintances. He will learn, to his own satisfaction, that through magic he can gain popularity.

THE BROKEN PENCIL

The requirements for this startling mystery are a dollar bill and a lead pencil, both of which may be borrowed.


You request a person to hold the pencil firmly between his hands, gripping it at the ends, and keeping the center of the pencil on a level.

Then you fold the dollar bill lengthways, and call attention to the sharp crease thus formed, which, you state, can be made as keen and as firm as any knife blade.

Holding the dollar bill by one end, swing it downwards a few times, so that the sharp crease strikes the center of the pencil. Finally you make a quick stroke, and the dollar bill breaks the pencil in two, leaving the astonished spectator with one portion in each hand.

The Secret:

Even after you know the secret, you may doubt that this trick can be done. But one trial will convince you that it will work. It is impossible for the dollar bill to break the pencil, but there is a simple method whereby you make it appear as though the bill did the trick.

In making the final stroke, extend your forefinger. The hand must come down quickly, and the forefinger will strike the pencil along with the bill. As a result, the pencil will be broken in two. No one will observe this extension of the finger, due to the rapid motion of the hand, and you can then return the bill to its owner.

THE THIEVES AND THE SHEEP

This is a clever little mystery. Seven paper pellets are used. The performer states that two of them represent thieves, and the other five represent sheep. He holds one thief in each hand, and mentions that each hand is a barn in which a thief is hiding.

The thieves steal the sheep, one by one. First one hand picks up a ball of paper; then the other, and so on, alternately, until all the paper balls have been gathered.



One paper pellet in each hand begins the trick.

Hearing a noise, the thieves put back the sheep. The hands deposit the five paper pellets on the table, one by one; first one hand, and then the other.

Again the thieves steal the sheep, picking up the pellets alternately, one by one. At this point the farmer arrives on the scene. He inspects the barns. The hands are opened. To the surprise of everyone, the two thieves are found in one barn; and the five sheep in the other.

One hand holds but two paper balls, while the other has five.

The Secret:

The trick is accomplished by a very simple, yet artful system. Follow these instructions and it will work the first time you try it.

When you pick up the five pellets, start with the right hand. Pick them up as follows: right, left, right, left, right.



How the pellets are picked up. Also the finish of the trick.

In replacing five pellets on the table, begin with the left hand: left, right, left, right, left.

People will think that you have put back the five you picked up. They will believe that each hand now contains one paper ball. Instead, the right hand holds two, and the left hand none.

In picking up the pellets the second time, begin with the right hand: right, left, right, left, right. When you open your hands, you will have five paper balls in the right, and only two in the left.

THE BALANCED EGG

A good trick for the dinner table always provides excellent entertainment, and no trick is better suited for the table than this one. The impromptu magician asks for an egg, and when it is brought to him he recalls the story of Christopher Columbus and the balanced egg with which that famous personage perplexed the scientists.

In order to prove that an egg can be balanced, the magician sets it upright on the table, removes his hand, and the egg stands there. A touch of the finger and the egg topples. It may be thoroughly examined to prove that no special preparation was employed.



The Secret:


Before presenting this little mystery, pour a small quantity of salt on the tablecloth so that it forms a tiny pile of white grains, which are not noticeable on the cloth.

Set the egg upon the little heap of salt, and press it firmly. The salt forms a sufficient foundation upon which to balance the egg. Some care must be exercised, and this adds to the effectiveness of the trick,

THE BALANCING MATCH

A match is not an easy object to balance—but you can balance it when you know the secret of the trick. Yet to the onlookers it will be a bit of clever juggling.

The match must be placed upon the back of the left thumb by the right hand. It will stand there, upright, but when other people try the trick they will not succeed.



The Secret:

There are two methods, both illustrated here. The first method is to bend the thumb slightly and set the bottom of the match in the crease of the thumb on the knuckle. Then extend the thumb and the match will balance, if you keep the hand slightly in motion.

The second method is different. Press the bottom of the match firmly against the back of the thumb, just below the thumb nail. By pushing it into the flesh in this manner, a firm foundation will be obtained and the match will balance quite easily. The hand, of course, must be moved back and forth if the match begins to topple.

THE WATCH FROM THE HAND-KERCHIEF

Read the description of this trick very carefully—for it is one that you will like and can use effectively.

You require three articles—a watch, a handkerchief, and a large ring—about the size of a napkin-ring. The ring must be smaller than the watch.

You place the watch in the center of the handkerchief and push the ends through the ring. Then you invite persons to hold the ends of the handkerchief.

Everyone will agree that it is impossible for the watch to be removed from the handkerchief while the ends are held for the ring is in the way.

Now you spread a napkin or a large handkerchief over the hands that hold the watch so securely in the ring. You reach beneath the cloth—and in a very few moments you bring out both the watch and the ring.

Yet when the covering is taken away, the ends of the handkerchief are still held and the handkerchief is uninjured.

The Secret:

How is it done?

That is the question everyone will ask. It seems incredible.

Yet there is a very simple method.

When you reach beneath the cloth, get hold of the edge of the handkerchief —along the hem—and pull it down through the ring. This can be done, even though the ends are held.


Remove the watch through the opening thus formed.

Once the watch is out of the way, the ring may be easily withdrawn.

MAGNETIZED MATCHES

Just an ordinary match box, filled with matches—yet the trick is very surprising. First, the box is opened part way to show the matches inside. Then the box is turned over, and the drawer is entirely removed, yet the matches do not fall. They stay in the box as though magnetized.

When the magician commands the matches to drop, they fall from the box and scatter on the table. The drawer is immediately given for examination—yet no trace of trickery is found.



The Secret:

A broken match is used. It is just a trifle longer than the width of the box. This match is wedged across the drawer so that it holds the matches in place.

The drawer may be opened part way to show the matches, but not far enough to reveal the cross match. Then the box is inverted and the drawer is removed, but the matches will not fall.

By squeezing the sides of the box, or slipping the forefinger beneath, the wedged match can be pushed from its position at the desired moment. Then the matches will fall, but the broken one will be buried beneath the pile and no one will know of its existence.

THE RING AND THE KNOT

A long piece of string is tied into a double knot, forming a loop. Then a ring is dropped on one end of the string so that it falls to the knot.

Another double knot is tied above it, the ends of the string are held by two people. Thus there are two loops, and the ring is on the upper one. Attention is called to this fact; then a handkerchief is thrown over the loops.



The ring passes from the upper loop to the lower.


Reaching beneath the cloth, you quickly transfer the ring from the upper loop to the lower. Yet the double knot is still there. In some mysterious fashion the ring has passed through the solid knot.

The Secret:

Use a stiff piece of string, and you can do this trick very easily. Under cover of the handkerchief, loosen the double knot and you will be able to push the ring along the string right through the knot on to the loop beneath. Tighten the knot and the trick is done.

The effect of this trick is always good because the double knot seems to be an impossible barrier for the ring to pass. The spectators will look for a trick in the ring, never suspecting that it could actually pass through the knots.

For this reason care should be taken to tighten the knots after the passage of the ring so that their appearance will be the same as before. It is also important to, use string that will respond quickly when the knots are loosened.

A MATHEMATICAL MYSTERY

This unusual mystery is very perplexing to those who witness it, yet it is brought about by a very simple mathematical calculation.

A person writes a row of six figures. Then the performer writes a total on a slip of paper and lays it aside. He asks someone to write another row of figures. Then the performer writes a row. Another row is written, and the performer writes a fifth row. The figures are added up. The slip of paper is unfolded and it bears the total of the addition.



The answer is 2,738.262

The Secret:

The performer notes the number first written by the spectator. He subtracts 2 from that number and writes it on the slip of paper, then he puts the figure 2 in front of it.

For example: The spectator writes 476,498. The performer then writes 2,-476,496. If the spectator should write 387,342, the performer would write 2,-387,340.


A second row is written. Then the performer writes the third row. In doing this he makes every figure of the second row add up to 9. If 375,306 are the figures written, he writes 624,693.

The fourth row is written and the performer, in writing the fifth row, makes each figure of the fourth total 9, just as he did with the second and third rows.

When the numbers are added, their total will be the number written on the slip of paper by the performer. This trick cannot fail if the instructions are followed.

THE MULTIPLYING COINS

Making money double is a trick that should appeal to everyone. In this little mystery, you show three coins—on both sides—heads and tails, and prove conclusively that your hand contains nothing else. Yet when the coins are shaken in the hand, they increase to six.



Note how the coins overlap on each side—allowing coins between.

The Secret:

A reference to the illustration will explain this trick better than lengthy words. The six coins are in the hand at the start; but they appear to be three instead of six.

First of all, the coins are held between the thumb and forefinger. They overlap, so that they can be shown on each side; but they overlap **outward on each side**. This means that five coins are used instead of three; and there is a center space which takes the sixth coin, as shown in the explanatory diagram.

It is an easy matter to place the coins in this position. The three coins at the front should show heads, and only tails should be visible from the other side. This enables you to show three heads on one side, and three tails on the other, and everyone will be positive that you have only three coins.


When the coins are shaken in the hand, they will multiply to six in the twinkling of an eye.

THE DISAPPEARING KNOT

This is an excellent impromptu trick that requires nothing more than a piece of string, about one foot in length.

The performer ties a single knot in the string, and draws the knot well down toward the center. Then he ties the loose ends into several knots, so that the single knot cannot be removed from the string without untying the ends. This will satisfy everyone that the single knot is completely isolated.

The performer turns his back for just a moment; and when he again shows the string, the single knot is gone. No trace of it remains. The performer did not have time to untie the ends, and tie them up again, so how did the knot escape? That is the question that will perplex the audience.



The Secret:

When he turns his back, the performer draws the single knot upward until it joins the large knot at the top. This is the work of an instant. It completely disposes of the single knot, for the appearance of the large knot will remain the same; and even the most observant spectators will have no idea of how the disappearance took place.



THE RELEASED RING

This trick involves a ring and a piece of string, but it is different from similar tricks because the ring is apparently tied quite firmly to the string, yet it falls free instantly.

The Secret:

The method of tying is important. The diagrams explain it very clearly and it should be practiced with the articles themselves.

First tie the ring on the string with a single knot, as shown in the first diagram. Note that the ring is turned to the left. This is important as that position must be maintained.



Push the left end of the string back through the loop and then through the ring. Push the right end of the string back through the loop. The proceedure is shown in the second diagram. Follow it closely so as to be exact.


Slide this peculiar knot down close to the ring. Then tie the ends of the string in a single knot. As you pull the knot tight, shake the string. This is shown in the third diagram. As you shake the string, the ring will fall off just as you draw the knot tight.

THE APPEARING COIN

This is an excellent way to produce money from nowhere. All you need is ar empty match-box. The drawer is opene(and is shown empty.

When the drawer is closed and re opened, the coin is there. It has mys teriously found its way into the empt box.





The Secret:

Open the drawer of the box half way and wedge the coin between the end of the drawer and the top of the cover. You can then show the drawer empty. Close the box, keeping your hand at the back so that the coin will not be pushed out. This simple action lets the coin fall into the drawer, and when the box is opened the second time the coin is in view.




The Secret:

Study the diagrams carefully as they explain every step in the trick. Note first how the ring is fastened to the loop.

When three portions of the string are drawn forth, the spectators each receive the parts marked 1 and 2. The long loop (3) which remains, is retained by the performer.

When the two people pull on the string, the performer merely lets go of the loop. As a result the spectators will find themselves holding the ends of the loop, with the ring no longer there.




How the coin is hidden.

THE FALL AWAY RING

The articles used in this trick are a loop of string and a borrowed finger ring. The ring is firmly fastened on the string, and the loop is drawn three ways, the performer holding one corner, and two other persons holding the others.

When the spectators pull the ends of the loop, the performer releases his hold, and the ring falls free from the string.

COIN AND MATCH BOX

This is a very effective way to make a coin disappear.


Spin a dime or a penny on the table. Take a match-box from your pocket, show that it is quite unprepared, and strike the spinning coin with the box so that the coin is trapped beneath it.

Ask the company to guess whether the coin is heads or tails. Then lift the match-box and show that the coin has disappeared.

The Secret:

Use an empty match-box, but turn the drawer upside down, so that there is only one thickness of wood at the bottom of the box. If the box is brought down sharply upon a spinning coin, the coin will be driven right through the wood and will lodge inside the box.

When you lift the box the coin will be gone. No one will believe that the coin could have gone through the box, so you can calmly put the match-box in your pocket while they are wondering where the coin went.

DRY HANDS

This is a surprising mystery, performed with a bowl of water.

First the performer shows his hand quite dry. He inserts it boldly into the water and keeps it there for a few seconds.

When he removes his hand from the bowl, it is as dry as when it went in—not a drop of water upon it!

The Secret:

Use lycopodium powder or stearate of zinc—either powder being obtainable at drug stores.

Rub the hand freely with the powder, and dust it off. The powder will be all over the hand but it will be virtually invisible.

When you dip your hand in the water, and then remove it, not a drop will adhere to the hand. The powder is waterproof, and the water will fall from your hand just as it falls from a duck's back!

THE SPINNING EGG

A plate of eggs is used in this trick. The performer picks up an egg and spins it on the table. Ie revolves like a top.

But when other people try the trick, the eggs refuse to spin!

The Secret:

Have a hard-boiled egg among the others. That is the one you spin. The uncooked eggs will not spin.


Remove the sepcial egg at the first opportunity and let the spectators try to spin the others!

THE SPIRIT NAME

The performer folds a sheet of paper so that it forms nine sections. Then he asks a person to write nine names, one in each section, and to put a special name in the center, among the other eight. This is a name upon which the person must concentrate, as it is the spirit name.

These names are not seen by the performer. At his instruction, the spectator tears the piece of paper along the folded lines, so that it forms nine small slips; and these are dropped at random into a hat.

Reaching into the hat, the performer produces the slip of paper which bears the spirit name.



The folded sheet of paper which bears the names.

The Secret:

When the paper is torn into nine pieces, all the torn edges will be rough; but the others will be smooth. Every slip of paper will have at least one smooth edge, with the exception of the center slip, which bears the spirit name.

This slip will have four rough edges. When the performer reaches into the hat, he can detect that slip of paper from the others, by the sense of touch.

Feeling the edges, he can quickly discover the slip with four rough edges, and that is the slip which he brings from the hat.



The torn edges identify the center slip.

FINDING CHOSEN COIN

An excellent impromptu trick may be performed with a number of pennies—all alike, but bearing different dates. Toss the pennies in a hat and allow people to remove just one coin—to pass it from one person to another to note the date on it. Then it is replaced in the hat which is shaken. Reaching into the hat, you immediately pick out the chosen coin!

The Secret:

In handling, the coin becomes warm, and can be readily distinguished from its companions. Simply reach into the hat and feel for the warm one.

The other coins will be stone cold and you will have little or no difficulty in discovering the one you want!

ORANGE TO APPLE

The performer places an orange in a hat and reaches in as though to take it out again. He puts the fruit back, and after looking at it several times, finally brings it out.

But the orange is no longer an orange it has changed to an apple! The hat is shown empty.

The Secret:

Peel- an orange very carefully by cutting the skin into quarters. Choose an apple of about the same size and carefully cover it with the orange peel.

At a short distance this will appear to be an orange. Put it in the hat, Each time you reach in, remove part of the peel and secret it beneath the hat band. Bring out the apple.

NAMING CHOSEN FRUIT

An orange and an apple are used in this trick. Some person holds one in each hand, while the performer turns his back. The holder is instructed to raise either hand—then place it on the table beside the other.

Looking at the hands the performer names which fruit was lifted—the apple or the orange.

The Secret:

The blood leaves the hand which is raised. It becomes whiter and the veins become smaller than the other hand. By a brief glance at the hands it is easy to tell which one was raised.



THE MUMMIFIED FINGER

A good comedy trick is always appreciated. Here is a fine one performed with a little cardboard box which you can carry in your pocket.



You bring out the box and state that it contains the finger of a mummy. Lifting the lid, you show the finger lying on a bed of cotton. When someone leans close to inspect the finger, it suddenly comes to life and points at him.



How the finger enters the box.

The Secret:

The finger is your own. But it is attached to your hand, and hence is quite lively.

The box is prepared before hand by cutting a small hole in the bottom, just large enough to admit your finger. When you reach in the pocket thrust your finger through the bottom of the box.

When you hold the box on your hand its appearance will be quite natural. Lift the lid and show the finger, which is bent inward. It will appear to be an imitation finger if you hold it quite still.

Keep the finger quiet until the psychological moment. Then raise it and watch the fun.

FLOATING LUMP OF SUGAR

In this trick you place a lump of sugar very carefully into a cup of coffee. Set the lump of sugar flat—let go—and there it floats!

In a few seconds, the lump begins to sink and goes to the bottom of the cup.

The Secret:

The mysterious force that keeps the lump of sugar afloat is another lump, which you secretly stand on end in the cup. It is invisible in the coffee (which should contain cream). Set the visible lump upon the upright lump of sugar and it will appear to be floating on the surface.

SPIRIT WRITING

For this trick you require a sheet of carbon and a pad of paper. You state that you will cause a very mysterious message to appear.

Under the top page of the pad you place the sheet of carbon. Then you ask someone to write a certain question on the pad —on the top page—and to sign his name . beneath it.

This having been done, it is quite obvious that the writing will be transcribed, or duplicated on the second sheet of the pad, which is under the carbon paper.

So you tear off the upper sheet, and remove the answer! And beneath this mysterious writing appears the carbon copy of his own signature, proving conclusively that there is no trickey!

The Secret:

This trick is accomplished very easily. The secret lies in the carbon paper. Take the sheet of carbon and bend in a portion of it, so that it is face to face with the rest of the paper. But do not make the bend at the center. Only a portion of the carbon paper should be face to face.

On the second sheet of the pad, write the answer—through carbon—of the question that is to be written. Do not let people see this.

Insert the carbon paper so that the double portion is at the top of the pad. When the question is written, it disappears—due to the double faced carbon. But the single portion, at the bottom, will permit the transcription of the signature.





SIGNIFICATION OF DREAMS

By HOWARD THURSTON

The people of antiquity, from whom we have learned much that we know of magic, or the art of divination and of philosophy, regarded dreams as direct messages from the spiritual world, of either divine or diabolical origin, and their interpretation was elevated to the rank of a science. At the courts of Babylon and Tyre, of Egypt and of Solomon, the interpretation of dreams was the task of the soothsayers.

It is a matter of historical record that the city of Carthage was rebuilt by Augustus Caesar in consequence of a dream of his Uncle Julius, and part of the architectural improvements resulting from this dream are tangible things to be seen amid the ruins of Carthage to the present day. Such tangible and useful things, too, were dreams of the Emperor Julian and of Calphurnia; and such was the dream of Oliver Cromwell that he should rise to be the greatest man in England.

Cabanis, in his "Rapports du Physique et du Moral de l'Homme," says of Condillac that he often brought to a conclusion in dreams the reasonings on which he had been employed during the day, and it is said of Benjamin Franklin, that wise and enlightened man, that he believed that he was often instructed in dreams as to the course he should pursue the next day during that period fraught with so much anxiety to the then American Colonies. Coleridge, the poet, tells us himself that two hundred lines of his beautiful poem, "Kubla Khan," came to him in a dream. On waking he set down the two hundred lines; then he was interrupted and the rest of the dream poem was lost.

hundred lines; then he was interrupted and the rest of the drcam poem was lost. "We are such stuff as drcams are made of," wrote the Bard of Avon, and my experience in many lands has taught me the truth of this. What was true at the time of Genesis is true today, for truth is vital and must prevail! Psychologists believe that dreams are caused by the flight of the soul to other regions and the soul, returning to the body, remembers the strange things it has seen. If it can go backward, then it is psychologically reasonable that it can go forward. If it can tell of events that have happened, events that probably were not within the dreamer's ken, then it can project itself forward into the hours that are yet unborn, and, returning, warn the dreamer of what good or ill is going to chance.

Note—The following refer to normal dreams. If you have a vivid and unusual dream it will be well on waking to cast your thoughts back to the events of the previous day or the two or three previous days. Some extraordinary incident may have chanced that, leaving an indelible impression on your brain, recurs to you in sleep. If there have been no such incidents, then the following well-tested significations and interpretations may be of great value to you.








Right: The "Human Pincushion," an illusion presented by Thurston, in which solid spikes pass through a girl's body without injuring her.



NUMEROLOGY The Interpretation of Numbers

By HOWARD THURSTON

Numbers are a vital factor in all affairs of humanity. Their power is universal. Through NUMEROLOGY, the great, ancient science of numbers, the character of everyone is revealed.

There are nine vital numbers in Numerology. They are 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9. Now every number is composed of these numbers, and every number can be simplified to one of these vital numbers.

Here is the simple method: Take a number like 53. It is formed by 5 and 3. When these figures are added, they form 8. Thus the number 53 is simplified to the vital number 8.

Sometimes vereal steps are necessary. Take a number like 69. These two figures. 6 and 9, total 15. The figures 1 and 5 must then be added to form 6 as the vital number. Always eliminate a cipher (0).

For example: September 12, 1897. In numbers, this is expressed as 12-9-1897, September being the ninth month of the year. These figures 1, 2, 9, 1, 8, 9, 7, add up to 37. In order to find the meaning in numbers of any person's name, a certain value must be ascribed to every letter of the alphabet, according to this table:

To find the vital number of the name HOWARD THURSTON, add the numbers thus: 8 (H), 6(Q), 5 (W), 1 (A), 9 (R), 4 (D), 2 (T), 8 (H), 3 (U), 9 (R), 1 (S), 2 (T), 6 (O), 5 (N). These figures total 69, which simplies to 15, and then to 6, giving the vital number 6.

This can be done with any name you wish, but you should always use the name which a person commonly employs, because that is the name whose vital number counts.

Thus every person has two vital numbers, one of birth, the other of name. Consult the charts which follow and you can learn the natural characteristics of any person, according to this science. Each chart is divided into two sections. A person with 8 as a birthday number and 3 as a name number should consult the upper section of chart 8 and the lower section of chart 3.

The charts that interpret your vital numbers and give their full significance will be found on the following pages.

CHART ONE

For Those Who Have One as a Vital Number

This number shows progression and high activity. It is a very strenuous number, pointing to a single goal and denoting unswerving power.

You will have courage and self-reliance. but will be more imitative than imaginative and creative. You will be capable of making money, and generally free to spend it. CHART TWO



Birthday Number 9






THE THURSTON RELIEF FUND BENEFITS PITTSBURGH MINING CAMPS

Thurston's magic is not confined to the theater. It brings untold benefits to every city in which he appears, and it is a mighty power that has carried comfort and happiness into thousands of homes. Thurston's magic has become a constant aid to those who are in poverty and distress; and no one man has given more individual effort to assist the needy.

When Thurston arrived in Pittsburgh, and opened a three weeks engagement in January, 1928, the coal strike of western Pennsylvania had reached its second year. Thurston's attention was directed to the pitiable condition of the miners' families. He spent two days visiting the homes of the miners and was convinced of their distress. He immediately set his entire organization to work, and the Thurston Relief Fund sprang into ceaseless activity. Through the cooperation of Charles Danziger, editor of the Pittsburgh "Sun Telegraph," with the support of Mr. Bitner, the publisher, the tremendous campaign was instituted without delay. A special performance was held at the Pitt Theatre, and the attendance broke all records.

On Saturday, Mr. and Mrs. Thurston, their daughter, Miss Jane Thurston, and Mr. Arthur Chase, director of the Thurston Relief Fund, visited the Pittsburgh Food markets, and there purchased forty tons 'of flour, meats, vegetables, and canned goods of every description.

At Thurston's direction, the vast quantity of food was placed upon three fleets of motor trucks and held in readiness for delivery on the next morning.

At ten o'clock Sunday, exactly forty hours after the benefit, the motor trucks were under way. Mr. and Mrs. Thurston, and Miss Jane Thurston proceeded with them and visited all three of the mining camps. They were received there with great enthusiasm. Mothers and children who were virtually without food were plentifully supplied. Woolen blankets had been added to the provisions and these were distributed by Mrs. Thurston to all who needed them.

In addition, toys had been brought for the children; and these were given to them by Miss Jane Thurston. These unexpected gifts brought gladness to those who had suffered for many months, and assured them of the necessities of life for many weeks to come.

It is quite probable that this Relief Fund was the quickest ever conducted in the United States. The action took place immediately, and the response was instantaneous.





Fortune Telling With Cards

Fortune telling with cards is an ancient science; in fact, the original playing cards, or tarots, were used expressly for that purpose. Today, a pack of ordinary cards can be used for the purpose of fortune telling; and the result will be interesting entertainment and diversion.

The system explained here is simple and easy to understand; and it is based upon methods that have been in use for many years.

The charts that appear below interpret the meaning of every card in the pack, according to the usage of the Gypsies and others who are famous for their ability to discover the significance of cards dealt at random.

It must be understood, however, that these charts do not purport to make certain predictions. They merely give the significance of cards according to an ancient rule, and the acceptance of these meanings lies entirely in the interpretation that the individual person may choose to make.

THE MEANING OF THE CARDS

DIAMONDS

Ace. You will profit through an invention or some great accomplishment. The card of wealth and high position. A present of a ring is in store for you.

2 You will accept a small present and hear good news. Something you desire very much you will shortly receive.

3 Your lucky star is rising; expect a change for the better. Do not be envious and greedy for wealth, it will come in time. Beware of a tricky blonde man.

4 A loss will come through your own carelessness; you are not concentrating sufficiently. You are much beloved by one of the opposite sex.

5 A large sum of money will come; use it with care and avoid criticism.

6 You will never want. There will be plenty in store for you through life. Be more patient and content.

7 Everything is in your favour; go in and win. The best card in the pack. You will realize your desires. Your best friends are blue-eyed.

8 You will receive a sum of money unexpectedly. Avoid flattering friends.

9 A chance to make a profitable investment is coming to you; accept it. Any transaction you make within the next ten days should be highly lucrative.

10 A wonderful card bringing rightness and good things. This is your year for success. Your ventures will bring happiness. Dark haired people are your most sincere friends.

Jack. You can easily see which person is your friend, if you use your head instead of your heart. You have a false associate who sneers behind your back. Beware. A blonde person loves you sincerely. Queen. Do not allow silly remarks to cause you unhappiness. Do not fret or worry because of a nagging, faultfinding, supercilious woman.

King. Listen to good counsel. Follow your friends' advice—it is better than you plan. Do not be headstrong and obstinate.

SPADES

Ace. The card of death and inheritance. You will shortly attend a funeral.

2 You will hear unpleasant tidings regarding a friend.

3 Do not be too anxious to confide in promiscuous acquaintances. One whom you have trusted has proven mean and deceitful.

4 Analyze your feelings and observances. Then act as you deem wisest concerning an affair near and dear to you.

5 Someone is awaiting a letter; write even if your pride is wounded.

6 An unpleasant interview will terminate most happily for you.

7 Tears for the loss of a beloved friend.

8 Sickness to someone dear to you and bad news from a distance will come soon.

9 Misunderstanding with a familiar friend. Be forgiving.

10 Brief affiction and a long journey in the near future for you.

Jack. A new acquaintance of yours. A mean, contemptible man, a betrayer of confidences, with pleasing manners and handsome to look upon.

Queen. Beware of a young "widow," a dangerous, malicious woman who would ruin your happiness.

King.' Beware of the stern critic who condemns without investigating or relenting. A very dark man will bring joy to you.

Fortune Telling With Cards

To tell fortunes with cards, the pack must first he shuffled and then cut three times by the person whose fortune is to be read, the cutting being done with the right hand if a gentleman is the subject; and with the left hand if a lady's fortune i sto be read.

a gentleman is the subject; and with the left hand if a lady's fortune i sto be read. Then deal the cards, one by one, and turn up every seventh card. The first three cards thus discovered should be laid in a row on the table. Of the four additional cards, two must be placed above that row, and two below.

The center card of the middle row is the most important, and the greatest significance should be attached to it. The two side cards are important, as they represent active, or immediate influences. The two cards above and the two below indicate minor influences which frequently refer to the distant future.

Use a full pack of fifty-two cards in telling the fortune.

King. Look out for the future; a designing lawyer will trifle with your affairs.

HEARTS

Ace. The card of love and marriage. Do not expect too much and your married life will be really happy. You are greatly admired by both sexes.

2 Your love affairs will terminate as you desire. A male cousin will be a comtort and inspiration to you.

3 The card of love and ambition, but often meaning misunderstanding and "divorce." You can never marry a person who loves you devotedly.

4 A pleasant meeting and an enjoyable time with a dear friend. Good news from a foreign land. A surprise.

5 A great change is in store for you. If you undertake a journey it will have a happy termination.

6 Banish hatred for old enmities. Live for the future and happiness. You will lose your attractiveness dwelling on the shadows of the past.

7 Pleasant thoughts and tranquility. Enjoy good fellowship and be popular. You should seek a high place in society.

8 A fair person's affection. Beware of a false friend whose insinuations are merely ealousy. Draw your own conclusions.

9 The card of good cheer and happiness. The light of prosperity and health will soon shine upon you. Your wish will come to pass.

10 Happiness! Triumph! Much prosperity and joy will be your portion for your unselfishness. Remember there is a reward for kindness to others.

Jack. A gay young bachelor who dreams only of pleasure. You don't quite understand your friend; approach him from another angle.

Queen. Love and happiness are within your reach-grasp them. You have a devoted woman friend and can trust her fully.

King. Your best friend is a trustworthy gentleman, a keeper of secrets. The card of honour and uprightness. You will receive an important message over wires within two days.

The Society of American Magicians

Howard Thurston Is President of the National Organization

The SOCIETY OF AMERICAN MAGICIANS is the oldest magical organization in the United States, and for a quarter of a century has been a real power in the world of magic. It has listed the most notable of magicians among its members, and for twenty-five years its annual banquet in New York City has been an event of great importance.

Assembles Throughout the United States

The SOCIETY OF AMERICAN MAGICIANS has seventeen assemblies throughout the United States. The Parent Assembly is in New York; and for years the organization has been truly national as the second assembly was located in San Francisco. The following cities are now represented: New York San Francisco, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit, Baltimore, Omaha, St. Louis, Boston, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Dallas, Syracuse, New Haven, Worcester, Springfield, Pittsburgh.

Each of these assemblies has its own officers, its own meeting place, and other individual features; but all are directly affiliated with the national organization.

Thurston the First National President.

Formerly the officers of the parent

assembly in New York were also recognized as national officers, the other assemblies having no vote in the choice of the Parent Assembly president, so that while the organization was nation-wide, only a small proportion of the members had representation at elections.

With the increase in size and prestige of the society, a national council was formed in 1927, and representatives from each assembly voted for national officers. At the first election, Howard Thurston was chosen as President of the SO-CIETY OF AMERICAN MAGI-CIANS.

Members from Many Lands

The SOCIETY OF AMERICAN MAGICIANS deserves its title, for it has included the leading magicians of the United States and Canada during the past twenty-five years, and its officers and assemblies are all located in America. 



The lower picture shows motorcycle police escorting Thurston to the baseball park. The benefit was the largest of its kind ever held in Baltimore.










There has never been another book like it. Those who have read the story have given it their acclaim; for it carries the note of sincerity that only a man's own story can hold.


