ECLIPSES OF THE SUN AND MOON.

AND OTHER

APPEARANCES IN THE HEAVENS!

IN THE YEAR 1812:

Calculated from New and Improved Solar and Lunar Tables,
Founded on the Newtonian System of Gravitation,
And agreeing with Observations to a surprising Exactness.

HERE will be Six Luminarian Eclipses this year, to be seen in one part or other of this Terraqueous Gibbe; and of these Six, only One will be visible to the Inhabitants of Great Britain and parts adjacent. The particulars of these Eclipses, which were calculated from new and very accurate Tables of the Sun and Moon, founded on the Newtonian principles of Gravitation, take as follows:

The First will be a small one of the SUN, on Wednesday the 12th of February, at our 8 o'Clock at Night; consequently invisible to us, not only, on account of the Time; but had it been at noon-day; it would have been

the same, as the Moon has great North Latitude; therefore cannot be but very small where greatest, and that will be in the Northern Parts of the Earth, where the

Sun is up.

The Second is a great and total Eclipse of the Moon, and if the Air prove favourable it will be visible for the most part here, but not all of it, as the Moon will set eclipsed. It happens on Thursday the 27th of February in the Morning. At the beginning of this Eclipse the Moon will be vertical, or directly over-head at midnight, in 8 deg. 58 min. North Latitude, in Longitude 59 deg. 29 min, West from London; which Place falls near the Island of Trinidad, discovered by Columbus in 1498. It is in South America, in the gulf of Mexico. separated from Paria, in Terra Firma, by a strait 8 iniles over, called by the Spaniards La Boca del Drago. At the middle of the Eclipse, the Moon will be vertical in 8 deg. 41 min. North Latitude, and 88 deg. 2 min. West from London, which Place is not far from Cape Blanco on the Western Coast of New Spain in North America. At the end of this Eclipse, the Moon will be vertical in 8 deg. 25 min. of North Latitude, and 116 deg. 35 min. of West Longitude from London; which Place falls in the Great Southern Ocean, a little to the South of Captain Clipperton's Island. Hence it appears, that the beginning of this Eclipse will be visible to all the Northern and Eastern Parts of Europe, as Sweden, Poland, Germany. Italy, France, Spain, and the Western parts of Africa; but the end will not be visible in any part of Europe or Africa, except at the Azores and Cape Verd Islands. The Moon will set with us on the Eastern parts of our Island totally eclipsed, but to the Western parts thereof, I expect the Moon will be coming out of total darkness before she sets. The Moon will rise eclipsed at the Sandwich and Society Islands; and the end will extend itself as far as the Friendly Islands, and the New Hebrides, New Zealand, all situated in the Great South Sea. This. Eclipse may very properly be called an American Eclipse. as it will be visible from the beginning to the end in every part of that great Continent, and also to all our West India Islands. In these Kingdoms of Great Britain, 9.7

the Time and Manner of its Appearance may be expected nearly to correspond with the following Type and Times:

The Moon will set that Morning, at London and parts adjacent, at 49 min. past 6 o'Clock.

The Third is another small Eclipse of the Sun, on Friday the 13th of March, at 22 min. past 6 o'Clock in the Morning, with respect to us; but the Moon having great South Latitude at the time of this Eclipse, it will be invisible to us, and not to us only, but even to all Europe. It will be but a very small Eclipse where greatest, and that will be in the remote Southern parts of the Learth.

The

The Fourth is another small Eclipse of the Sun, on Friday the 7th of August, at 54 min. past 4 in the Morning, with respect to us; but the places of the Luminaries at this conjunction lie so far from the Lunar Node, that her Latitude is too large, and that south too, to afford us a sight of the Eclipse. It will be visible only in high Southern Latitudes, where the Sun is up, and there but

very small.

The Fifth is another total Eclipse of the Moon, upon Saturday the 22d of August, in the Afternoon; it begins at 10 min. after our One o'Clock; the middle will be at 59 min, after 2, and the end will be at 47 min, after 4. consequently invisible in these parts. At the beginning of this Eclipse, the Moon is vertical (or directly overhead) in Latitude 12 deg. 2 min. South, in Longitude 161 deg. 35 min. East from London, which Place falls near the Islands called Queen Charlotte's Isles, in the Great South Sea. At the middle of this Eclipse the Moon will be vertical, or directly over-head, at Midnight. in Latitude 11 deg. 44 min. South, in Longitude 135 deg. 11 min. East from London; which Place falls on the Northern Coast of New Holland, near Arnheim's Land, about 120 Leagues to the west of Endeavour Straits, in the same great Ocean. At the end of this Eclipse the Moon will bé vertical in Latitude 11 deg. 27 min. South, in Longitude 109 deg. 15 min, East from London; which Place falls about 80 Leagues to the South of the Island of Great Java, in the same great Ocean. From the above statements, it appears that this Eclipse will be visible in Eastern Tartary, in China, the Philippine Islands, New Guinea, these of Malacca, Borneo, Sunda, the New Hebrides, and the Friendly Islands, to New Holland, and New Zealand; it also will be visible to all the unknown Southern parts of the World, quite round the Pole to the extent of 11 deg. or more. It will also be seen at the Society and Sandwich Islands, where the Moon will set before the Eclipse is over; it will also extend itself Westward as far as the Island of Madagascar, and to the Eastern parts of Africa, where the Moon will rise eclipsed.

Digits eclipsed at the middle, will be about 22°, from the South side of the Earth's Shadow.

The Sixth and last of these Eclipses is another small one of the Sun; it happens on Saturday the 5th of September, at 22 min. past our 7 o'Clock at Night, therefore invisible to us; it will be visible only in high Northern Latitudes, where the Sun is up, and there very small, as the Moon at that time has great North Latitude.

Other Appearances in the Heavens.

IN this Year there will be several near Appulses of the Moon to that notable Star of the first Magnitude, called Aldebaran; at some of these Appulses the Star will be quite hid behind the Moon for some time, in these Kingdoms, some of which, worthy of notice, happen in the following Order:

1. On Thursday the 23d of January, the Moon will make a near Appulse to Aldebaran, between 7 and 3 o'Clock in the Evening.

2. On Thursday the 22d of October, the Moon will eclipse Aldebaran, and it will make a pretty appearance through the Telescope, should the Air prove favourable, for the Star will be observed to immerge behind the




Edge of the Moon, at 57 min. past 11 o'Clock at Night, and will again appear to emerge from behind the Western Edge of the Moon at 51 min. after 12 o'Clock, apparent Time at Mondon, after having been hid by the Moon 54 min. The annexed Type shews the appearance where the Moon's Limb takes the star, as at I;

and the Star will appear again as at E; r, the Moon's upper

upper Limb. The Star passes to the North of the Moon's centre in this Occultation, as the Type shews.

3. The Moon will again eclipse Aldebaran on Wednesday Night the 16th Day of December, and, like the former, visible here, should the Air be clear; and will



make a pretty appearance through a good Telescope, for as the Moon will be near the Full, her light will rather obscure the brightness of the Star, which by the Telescope will appear very bright and conspicuous...

The Star immerges behind the Edge of

the Moon at I, at 48 min. past 9 o'Clock; and will again appear to emerge from behind the Western Edge of the Moon at E, at 59 min. past 10 o'Clock, apparent Time at London, after having been covered by the Moon, one hour and 11 minutes. The annexed Type will shew the manner of Appearance—v, the Moon's upper Limb.

Note, The beautiful Planet VENUS will set late at Night during the Months of April, May, and June, of this Year, and will gild our Evenings with her refulgent Beams,

long after the Sun is set.

METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVATIONS, &c.

Relating to the Year 1810;

With some Remarks on the BAROMETER or bourseast Weather-Glass.

THE Year 1810 was remarkable for a very cold and backward Spring, which was attended with continual sharp North-Rasterly Winds; all the Fruitin most places

was entirely cut off, and the Walnut Trees so damaged. that scarce a leaf was to be seen upon them, the beginning of June, even so, that in general a Nut was not to be found upon them that Year; and also all sorts of young Trees in Plantations, were so damaged by blasting Winds and Frosts, that the like I believe was not known in the memory of Man; this also was followed by much dry weather, so that Grass was in most places very short. The Barometer all the time kept very high and steady. The Month of May was cold for the Season of the Year, so that on the 28th, at Night, was so severe a Frost, with the wind North-East, that there was very thick Ice on Ponds, &c. the 29th in the Morning! This Frost did great damage. June was in general dry, with a high Barometer. all the Month. The weather in July was very changeable, attended at times with cold Winds. In August, a Thunder-Storm, attended with Hail, on the 4th, at Royston, and on the 16th much Rain; and on the 19th the Hygrometer changed to very moist, but the Barometer kept up, and even rose, while some Rain was falling, which was only from some low Clouds, and shewed that the weather was about to change, and become fine for the Harvest, as it was wet and showery before. This was a pleasing sight to a Farmer. But then this could not have been noticed without a good Weather-Glass; I say good ones, for there are many bad ones about the Country, not worth House-room. The 10th of November 1810, will long be remembered by many, for the melancholy effects of very heavy Rains, accompanied with a very strong Wind from the East, which caused great floods at Boston in Lincolnshire, and along the Coast to Fosdike, &c. attended with a very high Tide at 7 in the Evening, so that the Salt Water and Freshes overflowed the Country, dreadful to behold; and also at Bristol and the Western Coast much damage was done; indeed, the effects of this tremendous Storm were experienced almost in all parts of the Kingdom, especially along the Eastern and Western Coasts. The Barometer sunk suddenly from 29.3 to 28.5 at Royston, at that time.

I am sorry to observe, by the Bills of Mortality for 1810, in London, that about Twelve hundred of our fellow-creatures were victims to the Small-Pox during the last Twelve Months, and this through prejudices which have been unjustly excited against the Cow-Pox Inoculation, by the Ignorant and Designing!! I once more recommend the Vaccine Inoculation, not only from my own knowledge, but from a Testimonial of its perfect safety, mildness, and security from the Small Pox (that Scourge of Nations) signed by One hundred and eighty Physicians and Surgeons, resident in London: It is never fatal, or even dangerous; it produces no bad disorders; it requires no preparatory Medicines; it may be performed upon old or young, at all Seasons of the year, with perfect safety; and what is still more, it can only be given by Inoculation, so that no one can catch it by breathing in the same Room, or sleeping in the same Bed with a vaccined Person; and therefore it is not to be regarded in the light of a serious disease, but as an inestimable blessing to the whole Human Race! Embrace then the Blessing Heaven hath sent!

The above Hieroglyphic represents Vinco weeping, and relates to Mundane affairs; and I make no doubt but most of my Readers will easily construe what it means in a Political sense, as I shall leave it to Time and the Curious, as I did that of last Year, which is nearly allied to this.

Observations on the Four Quarters of the Year, deduced from Observations of Planetary Influx and Influences, operating therein.

Of the Brumal Ingress, or Winter Quarter.
This Quarter begins when the Sun touches the first
Scruple of the Tropical Sign Capricorn, and that will
be on Sunday the 22d of December 1811, at 25 min. past
4 o'Clock in the Afternoon; at which time 4 degrees

of & culminate, and the 8th degree of so will be ascending in the East. The Dab D h ad vac. D 2. et [O, from the 6th, 10th and 11th Houses of the Figure of the Heavens set for that time. The Moon then has but just past a square aspect of Saturn, and next applying to a square aspect of the Sun and Jupiter, from Equinoctial and Tropical Signs; the Moon entering her first Quarter at 30 min. past 5 that afternoon. But what is still more remarkable, there will directly follow this Ingress, an Opposition of the two Superiors, Jupiter and Saturn, and that from Tropical Signs, which take place at the entrance of the new Year; viz. the 1st of January; and on the 2d of February following, the Planet Mars comes to a square aspect of the Planet Saturn also. Indeed, the Portents of this Ingress shew great ambiguity in the Councils of Princes, and in the political affairs of the World; and many things portended by the Planets will not as yet be brought to light. This opposition of Jupiter and Saturn, will, I think, according to the current of second Causes, put forward the effects of the late Comet, whose influence we are still under; whence remarkable accidents, and actions of War and warlike stratagems, will follow in the course of this Year, in many Kingdoms in Europe, unless the God of all Power and Mercy avert his Judgments impending. This Position of the two grand Superiors, Jupiter and Saturn, will help little to the tranquillity of Ireland, whose affairs will still meet with broils, troubles, and disappointments; and indeed their influence will often frustrate designs for the Public good, if not the death of some great Man. There seems by this Ingress to be still great Impediments to a general Peace, and these configurations of the Planets rather fix than remove our Complaints.

When fiery COMETS o'er these Nations rise, And splendid Lightning gilds the upper Skies; When round their vortex they in fury roll, They fright with dire alarm each guilty Soul; As Omens certain of a labouring State; Of bloody Battles, and a hostile Fate. They shake with dreadful awe the pond'rous mass, And Desolation make, where once bless'd Order was. Vernal, or Spring Quarter.

The Sun now begins to display his genial influence of light and heat on the Earth; and this Quarter begins, this Year, on Friday the 20th of March, at 52 min. past 5 o'Clock in the Afternoon, when 28 degrees of II culminate, and 28 degrees of Virgo ascend; and the Planetary Positions are exhibited in the above Scheme. several remarkable Positions at this Ingress: separating from an opposition of Saturn, from Angles and Tropical Signs, and also, Jupiter and Saturn keeping within Orbs, and repeating again their Opposition in the Month of May following; these Configurations, I fear, are not very friendly to England, as well as some other Kingdoms and Places I could name; they portend Wars and Bloodshed; dissolving of Friendship and Alliances: but Mars with Venus in the 8th House, in a Sextile

tile Aspect of the Moon, in her own House, strong and potent, gives hopes that the good Angel of God will direct His Majesty and Counsellors, so that by their Wisdom and Prudence many things to the hurt of these Realms may be prevented or meliorated; for the Flames of War are not yet quenched, but still flashing at a distance. May Heaven protect my native Land, and bless the Councils of the King with Unanimity of Spirit, and sound Judgment! The French EMPEROR, and also Great Britain, appear very formidable to the surrounding Nations, for War is still the Fashion of the Day, to the great concern of many, which will cause great Oppressions for want of Trade, and murmuring at the great Burden of Taxes, &c. Many eminent and great Events and Alterations will in the course of this Year take place and come to pass in France, Germany, Italy, Spain, and Portugal; in Turkey, and amongst the Northern Powers also, to which, I fear, I must add, Great Britain and Ircland; and, indeed, most of the European. Powers seem to be concerned in one shape or other, for there is yet a strange Spirit of Discord amongst Mankind, and the revolutionizing Spirit of a certain EMPEROR is still hard at work. The United States of America will not be free from Troubles and Discontents, yet that People will act with some Caution and Prudence. In divers Nations there will be Strife and Contentions, with mischievous Stratagems, Rebellions, Seditions, with Armies marching and countermarching, making inroads to plunder and pillage defenceless Towns and Places. Be wise now, therefore, O ye Kings; be instructed, ye Judges of the Earth, &c. See Psal, ii. 10, 11. 12.

Of the Estival, or Summer Quarter.

This Quarter begins when the Sun enters the first point of the Tropic of Cancer, which this year happens on Sunday the 21st of June, at 28 min. past 3 o'Clock in the Afternoon, when 7 degrees of Scorpio possess the Horoscope, and 20 degrees of Leo cut the Mid-heaven. The Moon is angular in the Ascendant, departing from a of 2, and Δ of 3 and 2, and just before this Ingress there bappened an Opposition of Saturn and Mars from Tropical Signs, and also soon after this Ingress, before

June is out, Jupiter and Mars will be in Conjunction, and the Sun will come to an Opposition of Saturn; but this is not all, for Jupiter and Saturn are still within Orbs of their Opposition. These, most of them, are very untoward Positions, and denote great Changes and Vicissitudes in Kingdon's and States, both in reference to Religion, and other muters; for History abundantly informs, that such Configurations of the Planets do so much influence the Spirits of Men, that Wars and Tumults, Broils and Seditions, naturally proceed. The Affairs of Spain and Portugal, with some other Countries, are in a bad Situation; Russia, and other Northern Powers, are not very well off. Indeed, methinks I behold all or most of the States of Europe still involved in Contentions, Wars, and Tribulations. There will be a great Retrogradation of Affairs in divers Popish Countries; and I fear our famous City of London will meet with great Disappointments, &c.

Of the Autumnal Quarter.

This Quarter takes place when the Sun enters the equinoctical Sign Libra, making again our Days and Nights equal, which this year falls on Wednesday the 23d of September, at 22 min. past 5 in the Morning, when 21 deg. of III culminate, and 23 deg. of III is on the Horoscope, You Lord of the Ascendant in 6 of 3, in the 12th. The Moon, in the 8th, applying to a Trine Aspect of Saturn, and Square of Jupiter. The Sun and Saturn are both angular, and under the Earth at this time also. Hence the Planetary Aspects at this ingress, and following Months, imply miscrable Complaints among the People in general, on many accounts, for I fear our Work is not yet finished, nor the Sword put into its Scabbard; pacific measures seem to advance with very short and tardy paces.
